has been estimated at \$1,170,943,700
as compared with \$1,022,645,000 in
1938, an increase of 14.5 per cent. The gain
in the value of field crops was
53 per cent, while for farm
animals the gain was 24.8 per cent.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 28.—The
gross revenues of the all-inclusive
Canadian National Railway system
for the week ending Aug. 21,
1939, were \$4,707,566, as compared
with \$3,574,723 for the corresponding
week of 1938. An increase of
\$1,132,843 or 32 1/2 %.

FINANCE

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(AP)—
The stock market swung into a
fairly broad advance today while
dealings surer and faster stride.
Many outstanding issues were up
fractions to more than 2 points at
the close.

In the upturn, dealings expanded
to 381,570 shares compared with
224,100 the previous session. The
Associated Press composite price of
60 stocks was up 3 1/2 at 42.2.
Steels and aircrafts were quick
to advance on a flurry of buying
after the opening. Motors, coppers
and rails joined the push.
Canadian issues were fairly
steady, Dome and Lake Shore
Mines, International Nickel, Ford
and Imperial Oil moved forward.
Kennecott rose a point to 25 1/4.
Bullard added more than a point to
previous gains, closing at 31 1/8.
Up 1/2 to more than 2 were Bell-
telcom, Chrysler, American Tele-
phone, Great Northern preferred,
Douglas, American Smelting, Air
Reduction, Johns Manville, Inter-
national Harvester and Westing-
house. Among the few losers, Phil-
lips Petroleum dropped a point.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.—(CP)—
There were 194 cattle, 263 sheep
and lambs, 142 hogs and 44 calves
for sale on the two Montreal live-
stock markets today, according to
the market report of the Dominion
Department of Agriculture, live-
stock branch. These included 113
cattle held over from Monday's
and Tuesday's markets.
Cattle were at a standstill. Other
classes of livestock were steady.
A few bulls were sold at \$3 to \$4
for common kinds to \$5.75 for one
top bull.
Veal calves ranged from \$7 to \$10
according to quality. Grassers made
the bulk of the offering selling
mostly at \$5 with a range of \$1.50
to \$5.
Good ewes and wethers were \$2.25
black lambs \$3.25 and culls \$7.25.
Sheep were \$3 to \$5.
Bacon hogs were \$9 fed and water-
ered and up to \$9.25 of trucks. Se-
lects drew \$1 per hcg premium in
the regular cuts on off grades.
Sows were \$5 to \$6.25. Hogs sold on
rail grade brought \$12 net weight.
On Maritime markets rail grade
hogs were \$11.80 net weight. Sows
no. 1 weighing up to 270 pounds
\$5.25, flat weighing over 270 pounds
\$4.25, flat, no. 2, undesirable, all
weights \$3.25.
Choice steers were \$8, good \$7.50,
medium \$6.50, fair \$5.50, and com-
mon \$4 to \$4.50, choice heifers were
\$7.50, good \$7, medium \$6, and
\$5.25, and common \$4 to \$4.25.
Cattle cows were \$5 good \$4.50,
medium \$4, and fair \$3.50. Canners
were \$2 to \$2.25 and cullers \$2.50 to
\$3.25. Bonying bulls were \$3 to \$3.50
and butcher bulls \$3.50 to \$4.50.
Veal calves sold at 4 to \$5.25 and
grass calves at \$3 to \$4.
C C w lambs were \$8.75. Rail
grade lambs were \$19.

Fish "Fit For Kings Army" Soldiers Diet

"Fit for the King's Army." Foods
served to Canadian Active Service
Force units naturally have to mea-
sure up to high standard, and
Canadian fish foods are playing
an increasingly important part in
the Army's ration list these days.
The standard ration list of the Cana-
dian Army has recently been re-
vised and extended with reference
to fish foods and at present ap-
pearing on the list are practically
all kinds of fresh and frozen fish,
as well as clams, lobster, crab, and
dried, smoked and canned fish.
The canned fish in the rations
is made up varieties selected by
the supply officer and includes
such items as salmon, sardines,
etc.
Canadian fish foods, rich in mineral
content, healthful, nourishing,
and palatable, are good for the
army, and the soldiers are getting
in their enjoyment of good fish
dishes. Army chefs these days are
experts in their line and in some
districts at least, are showing an
interest in the Dominion Depart-
ment of Fisheries recipe book which
contains over 100 recipes for the
preparation of various fish dishes.
The extension of the army fish
list means two things. First of all
soldiers will be able to enjoy the
same high quality fish dishes which
are part of civilian life. Secondly
the army purchases will help to
keep the industry steady through
the expansion of the home market,
this partly offsetting the adverse
factor of restricted export markets
brought about by war conditions in
various parts of the world.

DISCUSS EVACUEE PROBLEMS

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—(CP)—Gen-
eral problems concerned with the
evacuation of children were discussed
here today by the executive of the
committee, Dr. R. C. Wallace, chair-
man, principal of Queen's University,
announced tonight.
Questions discussed, he said, were
those raised by the general commit-
tee in its recent session here.
The executive sat all day long,
and will shortly convene again.
An increased number of larger
vessels were operated in British
Columbia waters during 1939.
Raising in size from 10 to 40 tons,
292 vessels were in operation in '39
as against 256 similar craft in '38.
Six steam vessels were in operation
in '38 but none in '39. The number
of smaller boats in operation in
1939 showed a decrease.

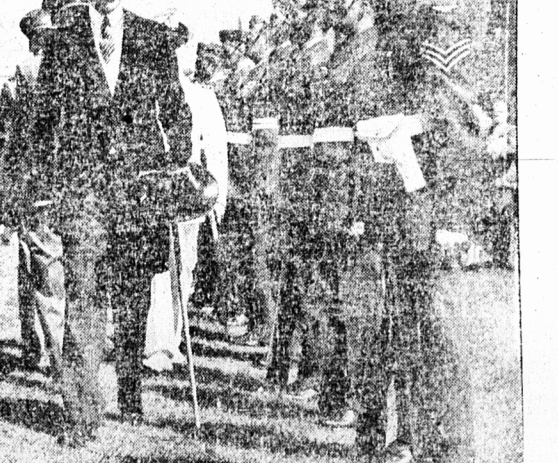

WINNIPEG, Aug. 28.—(CP)—Sale
of approximately 1,250,000 bushels
of Canadian wheat for deferred
shipment to the United Kingdom
was reported during today's session
of the Winnipeg grain exchange.
Prices closed at fixed minimum
levels of 73 5/8 cents a bushel for
the October future and 74 3/8 cents
for December.
All grades of cash wheat were in
good demand with no. 2 and 4
northern selling at 1-4 cents better
apiece at one time during the
morning.
