The Visit of the Duke of Cornwall.

THE W. C. T. U. PETITION

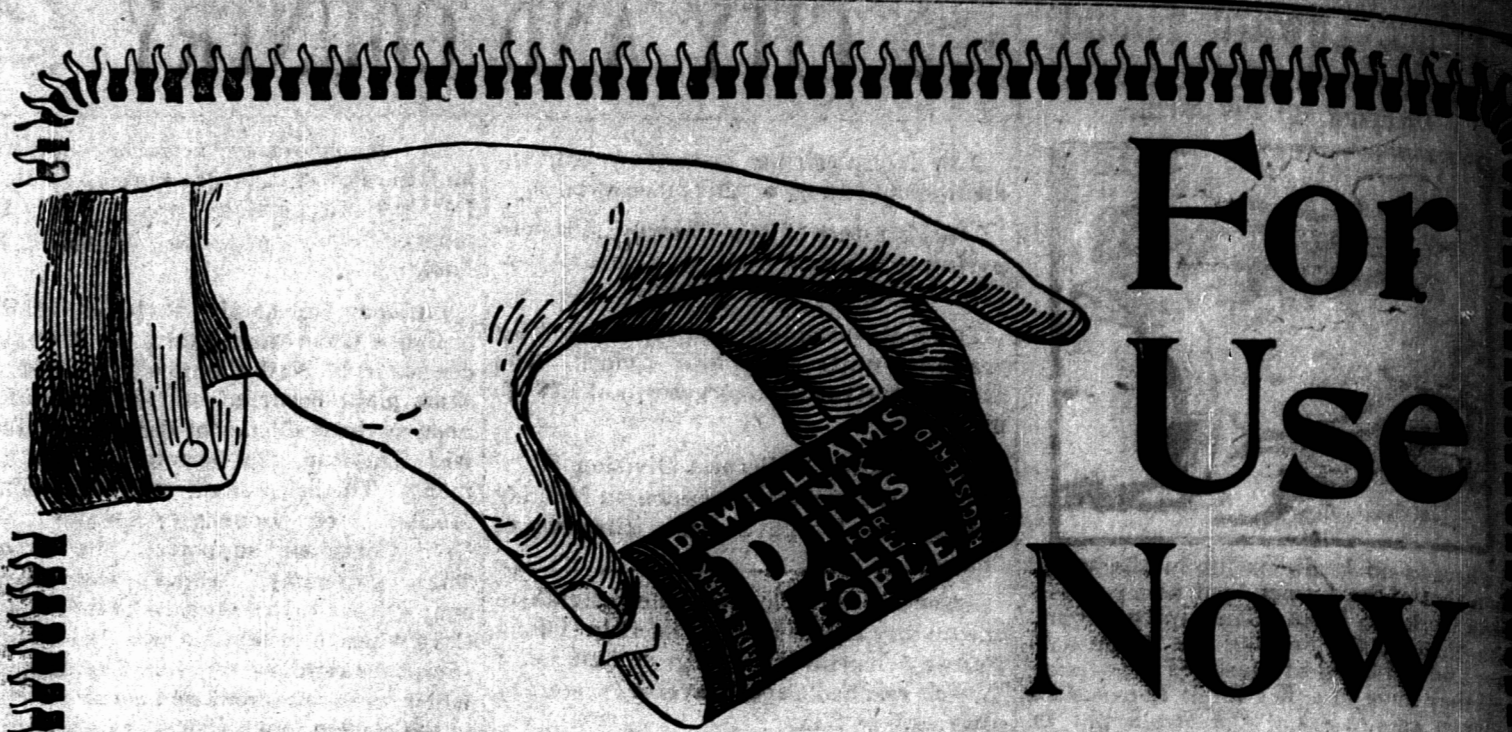
Restricting Cigarettes Presented and Considered.

FRIDAY, MARCH 22.
House met at 10.30. Mr. Wheat presented a petition from the Provincial Women's Christian Temperance Union and others asking that a law be enacted during the present session of Parliament providing for the prohibition of the sale of tobacco, cigars and cigarettes to minors. A bill was introduced and read a first time and a second reading set down for Monday. Mr. Wheat asked the Leader of the Government what, if any, action has been taken to obtain a visit to this Province by the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York whilst on their proposed tour through Canada in September next? Has any invitation been extended by the Government or any Member thereof to secure a visit from their Royal Highnesses, and what, if any, reply has been received in answer thereto? Does the Government propose to take any further action in the matter? The Premier replied that no official action had been taken. While in Ottawa the delegation had talked the matter over. The Government, however, would be guided by the Legislature. House went into committee with Hon. B. Rogers in the chair on the standing rules which were adopted with certain amendments.

MR. A. J. McDONALD.
Mr. A. J. McDonald continued the debate on the draft address. In years past he said it was not customary to make political differences among the laboring people, a people who rendered a dollar's worth of work for money received. He was sorry that the present administration had departed from the precedent of their predecessors. He contended that those who now had the disbursing of moneys did so with partiality. He cited the delay of repairs of the bridge at Seal River and claimed that the repairs were only of a temporary nature and as a consequence when the rains descended and the floods came the poorly executed repairs were swept away and it was found necessary to make a large expenditure, of course just at election time. He went on to show that the bridge at DeGros Meads and the ferry wharf Georgetown were also allowed to fall a prey to decay. He wished, also to call the attention of some of the newer members of the House to the fact that the system of Legislation conducted to-day is on the retrograde and the abolition of the second chamber was certainly a retrograde step. The Leader of the Government under the existing circumstances can introduce bills and can legislate as he wishes. He deplored the doing away of the Parliamentary Reporter, thus prohibiting the members from looking over and acquainting themselves with the accurate proceedings of the House in days gone by. In dealing with clause in the speech referring to agriculture he admitted that there had been a degree of prosperity, but the same thing existed in 1888 and a depression followed. The degree of prosperity certainly cannot be attributed to any particular Administration or Government, Dominion or Provincial. In reference to the death of the Queen he said he had been a loyal subject all through life, in fact his father before him bore true allegiance. He liked and admired the people that were loyal from their childhood and not loyal because of fashion. True loyalty, he contended was perpetual and not spasmodic. After paying a tribute to Canada's sons he said he was glad to know that the people were of a military spirit, ready to respond when the call to arms went forth.

HON. A. PETERS.
Hon. A. Peters followed and humorously reviewed the ground covered by the members of the Opposition. He wanted to know how it was that the Opposition was so strong at last session of the House and at the last election the Loyal Opposition had suffered such a defeat? He thought it certainly could not be attributed to the weather, as the Conservatives had the same chance as the Liberals. It was chilly however for the Opposition. During recess death had claimed a member of the Opposition who was an able debater and his demise was regretted by all. He wished to strongly emphasize the remarks made by the Leader in that particular. His funeral showed the almost unanimous esteem in which he was held. Death, politically however, came to the Conservative party in its direst nature. He was glad that many had gone down in the political battle who wasted the time of the House. They were among the slain and now he was glad to say business men composed the Opposition. In reviewing the hours of the session of 1900 he contended that if there was discredit that discredit was upon the members of the Opposition side of the House.

floor of the House he was only judicially carrying out the wishes of his constituents, and his wisdom has been proved by the election of a Liberal in his stead.

Every member sitting on the Opposition side of the House had crossed the floor—"all Pincus's every one of you." The Leader of the Opposition talks of blushing in connection with sending a delegation to Ottawa. He thought that the blush had not faded out of the cheek of the Leader of the Opposition when he went to Ottawa and secured \$200,000. This Province cannot wait, and must get a grant immediately or increased taxation will be necessary. Nova Scotia is getting her share of \$71,000 claim just gained by arbitration. In the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria this Province felt the blow as much as in other part of Her dominions. He hoped the session would not be a long one. The Opposition press had charged that the House was called at a season to shut off the election petitions. He was in Georgetown when Mr. McLellan fled the petitions. The House was called at a good convenient time for the farmers. If called later the Opposition would have another cry and state that the members were being kept away from their farms. So it is hard to please. A slur has been cast upon the installing of a Minister of Agriculture. It is well known that the chief resources of this province are agricultural and any improvement along its lines will be for the betterment of the country. The Opposition had in their speeches sneered at Mr. Rogers' ability as a practical farmer. He contended he was all the better and information he received would be modern. He noticed practical farmers on the floor of the House who reflected. He contended that if Mr. Rogers had never seen a farm he was duly qualified. Fortunately for the Government Mr. Rogers was in a position to take the portfolio. He trusted that untidely suggestions for improvement in the system of farming in this Province, would be given and thereby greater perfection attained. In replying to Mr. McDonald's connection with the doing away of the Parliamentary Reporter he considered it a very necessary move when it is considered there were members on the floor of the House who talked for hours in the day and repeated it at night in the galleries. He hoped that in the

course of three weeks the House would be able to prorogue, having transacted the country's business as business men.
Mr. John McLean then moved the adjournment of the debate.
House then adjourned until Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.
