

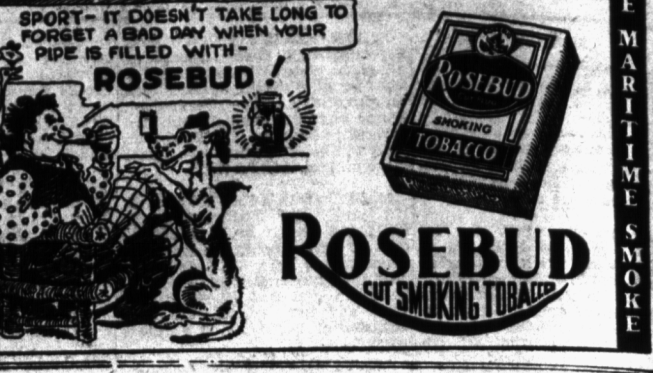

Lord Beaverbrook Pays Tribute To Canada

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Canada would play a leading part in all the world changes now happening, said Lord Beaverbrook, Canadian-born newspaper magnate in an address at the luncheon of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London. The Dominion's rapid advance in independence of thought and political attitude made this inevitable, he thought. Lord Beaverbrook spoke mostly in reminiscence of his own days in the main paid tribute to the late Andrew Bonar Law as a great Canadian who was chiefly responsible for the British victory in the Great War. Bonar Law, a native of New Brunswick, was a member of the war cabinet from 1915 onwards. Chancellor of the Exchequer and leader of the House of Commons for two years of the conflict and one of the signers of the Versailles Treaty. He died in 1923 long after relinquishing the premiership. Bonar Law was the greatest of all Canadians, said Lord Beaverbrook. "It has been said I dominated him, he dominated me. We owe to him our triumph in the war—and to no other man. I am not unconscious of the great services of David Lloyd George. I know full well he led the Empire to victory in its darkest days. But although Bonar Law surrendered himself to Lloyd George, the influence of Bonar Law was indelible. Bonar Law and Lloyd George, the greatest of all Canadians, Bonar Law," he added. "I, like Bonar Law gave myself to the Dominion of Canada and thought I failed, even though I fail, Canada will not believe me false. My proud boast that during the days of the war Lloyd George placed some trust in me and I can claim for him some demonstration of friendship now." (Lord Beaverbrook entered the ministry in 1931 as Minister of the Duchy of Lancaster and Minister of Information.)

NEW START FOR NEWFOUNDLAND

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 16.—Out of the chaos of financial distress Newfoundland emerged today with a new constitution, a new government and a new feeling of confidence born of faith in the Mother Country. At a brilliant gathering in a hotel ballroom, letters patent suspending the constitution under which the island had been a self-governing dominion since 1855 were read by Deputy Secretary of State Arthur Mews and declared law by Governor Sir David Murray Anderson. Under authority of His Majesty the Legislative Council was dissolved and a commission government was inaugurated to administer the affairs of the country "until it shall become self-supporting again." The commission, appointed on recommendation of Lord Amhurst and two colleagues who investigated the financial and economic condition of Newfoundland, is composed of three members from the United Kingdom, Sir John Hope, Sir John G. B. and Sir N. R. Trethowan; three from Newfoundland, Premier F. C. Alderdice, Secretary of State J. C. Puddister and W. R. Howley, K.C. With the Governor presiding, the United Kingdom government indirectly dominates the island's policies, but Sir John Hope emphasized in a brief address assured the gathering the new government was "nowise a dictatorship" but trusted for the fullest co-operation of all sections of the country and "resolved to render the best service for the country's welfare."

Will Erect Statue Of King In India

(G. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 16.—Agreement has been reached on the form of a statue of the King to be erected at New Delhi by the Indian Maharajas, and revised designs—the third since the original scheme was mooted three years ago—have now been approved. A pedestal has been designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens, and from a half-size model in clay by Charles Jagger, Indian craftsmen will carve in white stone a figure of the King wearing the robes he wore at the Delhi Durbar in 1911. The complete statue will be about 54 feet high, and the actual figure between 19 and 30 feet high. Indian craftsmen will work on the base from drawings supplied by Sir Edwin. The statue will probably be unveiled by the Viceroy at the end of this year or during the cool season of 1935.

Quebec Shelves Old Age Pensions

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, Feb. 16.—Establishment of old age pensions was definitely shelved in the Quebec Legislative Assembly today, a motion by Hon. Athanasius Davoine, Minister of Agriculture, to turn down the plan completely carrying the day by a 58 to nine vote. Discussion on the matter of old age pensions occupied the House throughout the afternoon session. There were votes of approval and amendments and one main amendment to the original motion in question—a proposal by Mme. Guerin, (Cons. Hull) that old age pensions be brought into effect.

Convict Wage Controversy Dealt With

(G. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—The proposal that convicts in penitentiaries should be paid wages is dealt with quite extensively in a report of Gen. D. M. Ormond, Superintendent of Penitentiaries, which has been tabled in the House of Commons. Miss Agnes MacPhail (U.P. Grey South East) urged payment to prisoners in her speech in the Commons this week. In his report the superintendent set out that during the year ending March 31 last \$2,755,848, being \$56,637 per convict, was expended for confinement and maintenance of convicts in penitentiaries only. This cost would be slightly under \$1.70 per day which is probably more than the average earned by free labor during the same period. The proposals advanced for the payment of convicts in most cases have suggested that the cost of keeping them confined be taken from wages, and the balance be given to support dependents. A convict has completed his term. "Should it be considered desirable," the Superintendent stated, "to allow remuneration at the rate of five cents per day for each day open 10 days in the hold of an eastern coastal steamship line freighter. But the only evidence of suzerainty was wording on the label of the award content—'in which, incidentally, was buried five-gallon cans of overproof rum. The crates, whose name police withheld, forgot to pay the duty. Once destined for Saint John, the rum is now in the customs shed."

Sauerkraut Boom Calls Police To Investigate

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DIGNY, N. S., Feb. 16.—The Nova Scotia sauerkraut industry appeared to Royal Canadian Mounted Police to be booming. Shipments to New Brunswick ports, they said, were increasing rapidly. While many persons interest in shipping activities officers watched loadings of barrels reputedly containing the vinegar-saturated shredded cabbage. They became more interested and decided to open 10 kegs deep in the hold of a similar manner before being released. All stockyards are cleaned and disinfected and maintained in a sanitary condition. In disinfecting stock cars and yards, lime-wash with an approved disinfectant is proper strength is used. During the year ended March 31, 1933, 65,065 cars were disinfected under supervision.

Prof. Rogers Returns to Queen's

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Feb. 16.—His work virtually completed, Prof. Norman McT. Rogers has resumed his place on the faculty of Queen's University Toronto, after spending several weeks in Nova Scotia preparing the groundwork for the province's forthcoming economic survey. Retained by the Nova Scotia government to prepare its case, Prof. Rogers has been gathering data for submission before the commission, to be appointed in the next few months. He will return to Nova Scotia about the middle of April to complete his work. The commission is expected to start its work early in May. It will be empowered to investigate Nova Scotia's economic situation with a view to pointing the way towards its industrial and economic recovery. Particular attention will be devoted to the effect of tariffs on Nova Scotia trade. No announcement of its expected personnel has been made by the government, but it is understood it will be composed of three men: its chairman an English economist. One member will be chosen from central Canada and the third member will be a Nova Scotian.

Speak Obedient and Unspoiled Youngsters. The two generations: Society always consists of two generations, the grown-up and the growing-up. The adult and the youth are mingled together in every community and nation. This has its very great advantages for both groups. Each brings its contribution to the betterment of the other. As benefits by the optimism and idealism of youth. Youth profits from the experience and garnered wisdom of age. But there are also disadvantages. Youth is restless, impatient, disturbing to the settled ways of the older generation. Age bequeaths the habit as well as its good habits, the vice along with its virtues. Here then is a problem for us to wrestle in temperance reform. Dealing with the Drinker. Society has inherited a large body of citizens who have developed the drinking habit. Whether they drink moderately and respectably or excessively and degradingly, they have acquired a habit that is extremely difficult to break. It involves a real struggle, a great moral effort, such as only very few can engage in without some strong emotional impulse like that of religion. Even then it requires a social buttressing and reinforcement of the individual's will in order to ensure continuance in the better way. Herein lies the supreme difficulty of securing the full benefits of prohibition. Under a prohibition regime, the habitual drinker seeks to satisfy the acquired appetite, legally if he may, illegally if he can. It is this body of citizens who give the opportunity for the bootlegger, smuggler, dive-keeper, moon shiner and all the rest of that breed of violators of law and corruptors of society. Is there any way by which this element could be provided in under legal supervision and control with the aim of eliminating the habitual drinker in one generation? This may be an impossibility, but it would seem to be at least worth serious consideration. Dealing With Youth. Our real hope is with the rising generation who as yet do not know the taste of strong drink. With these it is a matter of forming good habits, not of reforming bad old ones. The drink habit is not a natural one. It is abnormal, artificial. In a majority of cases it probably is distasteful to begin with and has to be cultivated. All that should be encouraging to the work of social reform. In dealing with the young our problem is simply one of protection and prevention, whereas with the habitual or near it is remedial and curative as well.
