He also was one of the pioneer milk ranchers on the Island and was owner of an extensive combined fox and milk ranch, which is very skillfully managed by his son, Mr. Nelson Sheen. Besides being a keen business man, who, by his honorable dealings, made a host of friends, he was in his private life a splendid citizen and always took a great interest in community affairs. Although in failing health for some time, the late Mr. Sheen was only confined to his bed about ten days before his death on Thursday
