In the case of Willis Brown vs. George Warren, an action for capturing a fox, judgment was given for plaintiff for \$7.50. Geo. Thibedeau vs. Wilfred Shea and Bernard Riley, an action for wages. Judgment was given for \$57.16. The Court adjourned till the latter part of the month for the trial of two cases; one a horse case and the other a case in regard to the taking of some turkeys. The latter case has been referred to His Honour Judge Duffy of Charlottetown. Four school cases were tried in which judgment was given for the plaintiff in each case. This completed Tuesday's cases.
