RUSSIAN-GERMAN UNDERSTANDING

Secret Treaty Between the Czar and Kaiser Guaranteeing Mutual Support

GERMAN DESIGNS ON THE NETHERLANDS

Strained Relations Between Russian Foreign Office and Admiralty--Gout Lamsdorf Affronted and May Resign Today--The Czar Inspects the Baltic Torpedo Flotilla.

RUSSIA AND GERMANY.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 10--(Special)--Reports of a secret understanding between Russia and Germany are revived.

WHAT GERMANY GUARANTEES.

It is said Germany gives a guarantee regarding the German frontier which will enable Russia to withdraw troops from the big garrisons in Russian Poland and send them to the front; also agrees to support Russia in the peace negotiations after the war.

DESIGNS ON THE NETHERLANDS.

Russia, it is said, is to support Germany in an attempt to incorporate the Netherlands in the German confederation in the event of the Queen Wilhelmina being

without a direct heir.

STRAINED RELATIONS EXIST.

Strained relations between the Russian Foreign Office and the Admiralty over the question of contraband have reached an acute stage.

LAMSDORF TO RESIGN.

It is said Foreign Minister Lamsdorf considers he has been personally affronted and may resign tomorrow.

INSPECTING TORPEDO FLOTILLA.

Reval, Russia, Oct. 10--(Special)--The Emperor to day inspected the torpedo flotilla which accompanies the Baltic fleet to the Far East.

The Emperor and Empress returned to St. Petersburg this afternoon.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Held Last Night--City Will Issue More Debentures at 2 Per Cent Premium--Action Against the City is Threatened.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night. There was present His Worship the Mayor and Councillors Hooper, Prowse, Reddin, Riley, Rogers, Brown and Paton. The minutes of last meeting were confirmed and bills etc. passed.

Communications were read from John Combs asking for a reimbursement for injury to wife's health; (this affair has since been settled) from Stanislaus McQuinn and Abraham Henry applying for position as engineer in the new market building; from Matthew Murphy for an increase of his salary; from John C. Reedy, Superintendent of Farmers Institutes asking for a building, preferably the basement of the market, for a short course in live stock judging; from James F. L. Caron, Steam Heating Engineer reporting on the city market heating apparatus.

The selection of an engineer for the new market was left with the market and public property committees. Coun. Hooper speaking on an increase for Mr. Murphy, caretaker of the Fire Department, volunteered that official would be willing next year to give him an increase. Coun. Brown urged an increase for Mr. Murphy on which action should at once be taken. It was agreed that the salary be increased from \$450 to \$500 beginning next year. A letter was read by Coun. Reddin from the Board of Fire Underwriters referring to dangerous condition from fire of old building owned by John Joy Water Street, known as Old London building.

W. S. Stewart, K. C., wrote that he had been retained by John Fraser to act

asit against the city for alleged assault by Officer Taylor on Queen Square. He asked for a settlement. In connection with the same matter one Fitzsimmons who conducted a show on Queen Square during exhibition week wrote asking for settlement for property destroyed and return of a banner stolen.

Coun. Prowse said an investigation had been held and as far as the committee could ascertain the police were not to blame. The matter was left with the Mayor and Recorder. Coun. Brown thought the proceedings were disgraceful and the Mayor only regretted that those citizens interfering were not at once arrested.

It was agreed that \$16,000 debentures in \$500 sums paying interest at 4% for 20 years for permanent work be issued. Coun. Hooper said the credit of the city was never higher and suggested asking for 2% premium instead of 4% as in the past. This was also agreed to.

It was moved by Coun. Hooper, seconded by Coun. Prowse, and carried, that the City arrange for a special loan of \$15,000 from one of the banks. This is necessary as the market costs \$50,000 and the City has now power only to issue \$35,000 for that purpose. The report of Inspector Caron was accepted and \$10 voted for his services. Coun. Paton suggested that the two east rooms of the Market Building be used for an Art Gallery. The suggestion was endorsed by the Mayor and some councillors and Couns. Paton, Hooper and Reddin appointed to arrange for hanging of pictures, etc.

After other discussion the Council adjourned.

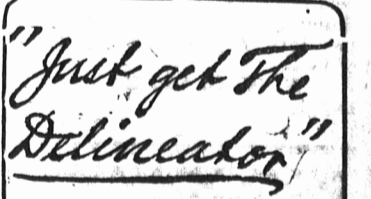
