FRANCE HASN'T SCARED ITALY

ROME, Jan. 24—The subject of the detention of 29 Turks, said to be members of the Red Crescent Society, by the Italian authorities, who captured them on the French steamer Manouba, was fully discussed at conference today between Premier Giolitti, Foreign Minister Marquis di San Giuliano, and the French Ambassador to Italy, Camille Barrère. The conferences are said to have been very cordial, but the Turks are still held under arrest on the island of Sardinia. Italy maintains her right to capture and search ships of neutral nations suspected of carrying contraband of war. This has been the course followed, not only in the case of French steamers, but also with British, German and Austrian. Italy does not, however, admit any limitation of that right. It is her intention to protect her army before the enemy. So far as the Italian authorities will speak, the examination of the Turks in question seems to have proved that both doctors and nurses were included in the group of prisoners, but it is suspected that the object of their presence was to distract attention from others who are believed to be Turkish officers, and they were in possession of arms, maps, and a cheque for a large sum of money. Italian officials called attention to the fact that another alleged Red Crescent expedition was once halted in Egypt by Gen. Kitchener and sent back as it was composed of belligerents. Italy admits that France is exercising her duty admirably as a neutral power, but urges that France should not resent the wish on the part of Italy, even if a mistake is made, to exercise what she considers to be her right, as neither France nor any other nation can guarantee that its applying all possible measures to observe strict neutrality, she may not be deceived. The result of the conference has been reported to the French Government, and so far, the two countries have been animated by such a conciliatory spirit that it is expected a satisfactory solution will be found.

THE MYSTIC FIGURE OF THE MIKADO. Many admirers of Japan and of its sovereign do not hesitate to hail the Emperor Mitsuhiro as the greatest man of the age. Others do not go so far. In the eyes of the Japanese of course their ruler is not a man but a demigod and all comparisons of this world fail. For 600 years the emperors of Japan lived not figuratively but actually behind screens. They never trod this lowly contaminating earth. Nothing of what went on outside of their beautiful prisons ever penetrated to their sacred ears. Then there was a political upheaval, the usurping Tokugawas were put to flight and for once we see the Mikado plain, a pale, shrinking boy with his eyes blinking in the light with which his throne was now so suddenly flooded. He could not walk unaided even when it was thought for a moment that his life was in danger, and the language that he talked was not Japanese but a palace language only understood by a handful of courtiers and palace servants. Yet this helpless boy whom Sir Harry Parks and the other representatives of the western world in China during the memorable year of 1868 were inclined to sneer at and even brow-beat, has conquered China, so long the mistress of the east, fought Russia to a finish and raised his once obscure island empire to the rank of a world power of the first magnitude. To his people, despite all the other changes which the last decade has seen, the Mikado still remains the vague mystic figure of the feudal days. Outside of the imperial clan no man has ever spoken to him directly, not even Prince Ito or General Yam-

SPEAKER SPROULE PRAYED IN FRENCH

OTTAWA, January 24—Speaker Sproule achieved his ambition today and, belle langue of old France tripped melodiously from his tongue as he recited the Prayers in French. The rumor had gone the rounds of the corridors and lobbies today and when the House assembled at 2 o'clock there was an exceptional attendance. The prayers were read alternately in French and English and the former duty was relegated to Mr. Laplante, assistant clerk. But today Speaker Sproule read the prayers in French with the favour of a delightful Irish brogue. So pleased were the French-Canadian members of the House, that instead of the orthodox, "Amen," a round of parliamentary applause greeted the conclusion of the GRAIN GROWERS.

BRANDON, Jan. 25th The annual meeting of the Grain Growers' Association opened yesterday with 455 prominent farmers present. The address of the President, the Hon. J. H. Ross, was a plea for lower freight rates, which he declared were today most exorbitant and a burden on the entire Canadian west. Further, the address declares the intentions of the Grain Growers to press the demand on the Dominion Government for terminal elevators under government ownership and operation at Fort William and Montreal. The recent merger was also criticized for advancing the price of a necessary building material in the west. From the attendance and enthusiasm displayed the organization is an all powerful political force in the west.

the prayers. And Speaker Sproule, veteran parliamentarian as he is, blushed very red when Sir Wilfred Laurier rose and congratulated the speaker on his progress in the French language. This action of the ex-Premier was all the more significant as at the beginning of the session, when Speaker Sproule was elected, he registered a protest against his election. When the history of how an English Speaker of the House of Commons, without any previous knowledge of the language, became competent to read it within three months, it will be found that the Hon. F. D. Monk, minister of public works, was the prompting force. And indeed it was with a twinkle of pardonable pride in his eye that the Minister of Public Works congratulated his pupil, who was the modern example of the aphorism, "It is never too late to mend."

This will be the last Wednesday evening during the session on which M.P.'s can devote their evenings to social enjoyments instead of to their legislative duties, Premier Borden having given notice that he will move that hereafter Wednesday shall be placed upon the same status politically as any other day. This shows a determination on the part of the Government to press towards progression as rapidly as possible. Indeed there is a rumor that it is the desire of the Government to conclude the session by March 10. The adjourned debate on old age pensions was resumed by E. M. MacDonald, (Picton). The House went into committee of supply and adjourned at 5 o'clock.
