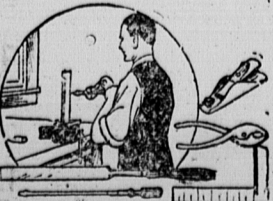

Citizens with shot guns laid down a barrage so that the Porters could leave their house. Not until several of the birds were killed would the rest retreat.

VATICAN TO ISSUE EIGHT NEW COINS

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 5.-The Vatican will issue eight different types of coins, under the monetary convention signed with the Italian government, it was revealed yesterday. The coins will include five and ten centime pieces in copper, two five centimes, one nickel one five and ten lire silver pieces, and 100 lire gold pieces. The coins will be of the same size and alloy as the Italian coins. The Vatican agreed that the coinage of each type would not exceed 1,000,000 Italian lire, (about \$52,000.) The coins will carry the likeness of the Pope or various saints, or the papal coat-of-arms as it was used in the time of the Pope's temporal power. The convention has a ten-year duration. The coinage will be affected in the Italian mint and all types will be placed in circulation by December.
