The latest news, first of all.

John Muirhead, Summerside, is ill of la grippe.

Ten or twelve fine boats have been built at Alberton this spring by Peter Ahern and John Dunn.

Rev. W. B. Crowell will preach next Sunday in Freetown hall at 11 a.m., Bedeque at 3 p.m. and Summerside at 7 p.m.

Misses Annie Cameron and Gladys Locke, pupils of the sisters of Notre Dame Academy, Summerside, have received their diplomas for the Palmer method of writing.

The funeral of the late Mrs. McQuarrie, Summerside, will take place from her late residence Granville Street to the People's Cemetery at three o'clock this afternoon.

Dr. S. R. Jenkins of Charlottetown was in Summerside yesterday afternoon having been called in consultation on account of the serious illness of Mrs. J. Lefroy Holman. At last reports she was in a very dangerous condition.

On Friday night, March 12th, a concert was held in St. Rock school, organized by Miss Ursula Gallant, teacher, with the help of her scholars and it was a great success. The house was crowded and everyone was astonished to see the way the several plays and dialogues were enacted by the wee little ones and those of larger growth. The violin as usual was ably handled by J. W. Boute, with an organ accompaniment by J. Martin and the Misses Gallant.

John Charles McCallum and Richard Matthews of Lot 10, were brought to Summerside and lodged in jail by Bailiff Ramsay of Portmore Cove yesterday morning. They are charged by W. A. Leard of Bedeque, with stealing lumber off land belonging to him situated at Lot 10. Upon arrival they were taken before Alex. Campbell, J. P., who remanded them to jail until the 30th inst. when they will be given a hearing. Both of the prisoners are well known and have both served time in Dorchester.

Much interest was taken in the seed meeting held under the auspices of the Bank River Farmers Institute at Bedeque on the 13th inst. Prof. Ross conducted classes in grain and small seeds judging. All were well pleased with the results, and wish that such instructive meetings could be held oftener. At the evening meeting the hall was well filled. First on the programme was an address on carrying by Prof. Ross. He is well up in the subject and no doubt the valuable information he gave about the feed and care of the dairy cow will be beneficial to those who had the good fortune to hear him. The adjourned debate, "Should hand separators be encouraged?" brought forth a lively discussion. The principal speaker for the separator was Jarvis Tanton, of Sherbrook. Mr. Tanton claims that he has never spoken in public. So that as it may be a hostile audience such as he had at Bedeque. The directors of the creamery have not changed their decision, made some time ago that cream separators at the houses will not be taken at the factory. The next meeting of the Institute will be held at Lower Freetown on Friday 26th inst.

Lots 27-28 Institute met in the schoolhouse at North Tryon on the evening of March 19th to discuss the advisability of having the Dairy butter of this province inspected before it is placed on the market. Meeting opened at 8 o'clock with Vice Pres. Noonan in the chair. D. J. Thompson began the discussion by stating the proper grading of all butter offered for sale. The first-class article would bring a better price, and the inferior would be driven out as it should be. Frank Lang claimed that if the maker's name was on every package sold it would be all that we needed in the way of inspection, as the makers of inferior butter would not be able to dispose of it at any price. Mr. C. Deane, by request of the chairman, gave his opinion on the question. He said something should be done as the quality of the dairy butter sold in many instances was very inferior. He would strongly urge the farmers to send their milk to the butter and cheese factories where it would be manufactured into a first-class article which would always bring a good price. John T. Dawson, G. H. Callbeck, Luke Wood and others made some very practical remarks on the subject. Moved by D. J. Thompson, seconded by John T. Dawson, whereas there has been a large quantity of inferior Dairy Butter placed on the market which is very injurious to the butter trade of this country, therefore resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting of the Farmer's Institute of Lots 27-28 that the name and address of the maker should be plainly printed on each package offered for sale. This was carried unanimously. The Vice Pres. gave a short talk on the advantages of belonging to the Institutes claiming that it was through the Institutes that the Provincial Seed Fair had been such a grand success; and a great benefit to the people of this Island through the sale of large quantities of seed grain to the farmers of the other Provinces. This seemed to have a good effect on those present as quite a number enrolled their names as members of the Institute. After a short discussion on the requirements of the packers' records in weights of dressed snow this very interesting and profitable meeting closed. J. E. H.
