Toronto is in the throes of a mayoralty contest, with three men in the field, Mr. O. A. Howland, ex-Mayor Shaw and Alderman Spence. The latter is a well-known temperance man and prohibitionist and will be remembered as having taken part in Scott Act campaigns in Prince Edward Island. The liquor interest has combined against him, while with their usual tactics the liquor men are endeavoring to alienate Mr. Spence's temperance friends by insinuating that he has made a secret "deal" with the trade. The Trades and Labor Council, made up of 75 labor organizations, are supporting Mr. Spence. The latest mail news at this writing is that a few days ago an effort was being made to induce one or other of the opposing candidates to withdraw, as the only sure means of preventing the election of Mr. Spence.

Ex-President Cleveland advocates an amendment of the United States constitution providing that the President shall be elected directly by the popular vote, that the term of office be extended to six or eight years and that no President shall be eligible for a second term. It is argued that this would be an improvement on the present system in several ways. The nation would be saved the disturbance and turmoil of frequent elections, and the President, instead of constantly planning and perhaps intriguing to gain a second election would devote himself to making the best possible record during his single term. By that alone he could hope to live in history. He would be less a party man and more a national figure. The longer term and changed conditions it is thought might also add more dignity to the Presidency.

Greater New York finds that the union of several cities in one has involved greater cost of Government than the total of governing the separate cities. It costs about 30 per cent more, in fact, than to perform the same services in 1897. The policing of Greater New York costs \$12,000,000 a year, as against \$10,000,000 for the same territory three years ago. The cost of the fire department has risen from four millions to nearly five millions, and the schools, which in the separate cities cost \$10,330,463 yearly now cost \$18,512,817. The entire budget for the big city in 1901 is \$68,000,000, showing an increase of over \$28,000,000 in three years.

Hitherto the Australian Colonies were not included within those parts of the Empire which enjoyed the penny rate of postage to and from Great Britain and Canada. New Zealand has now adopted penny postage and will share in the benefits of the low inter-imperial rate hereafter. There is little doubt that the Commonwealth will also shortly come into the same relation, but legislation by its new parliament will first be necessary. Probably within a year or two the two cent rate will prevail throughout the entire British Empire and the entire English speaking world.

The Examiner announces with regret the resignation of Mr. A. Irwin from its staff. Mr. Irwin will retain the control and management of the P. E. Island Magazine, which was originated and developed by him in a manner that has met with general public appreciation.

There appears to be a revival of the old plan of bringing St. John harbor at Navy Island and dispensing with the ferry. The example of Charlottetown is in prospect of being followed.

After all the representations that have been made by the various Boards of Trade, by the press and by private citizens to secure the regular telegraph service which their contract calls for, but which the Anglo American Company refuse to give, it would seem to be about time that the federal government declined longer to pay the big subsidy. The contract was made originally between the Island Government and the Company and it may be the duty of the Provincial Government to take the initiative. In any case the two Governments are on friendly terms and can no doubt act together to secure the rights of the people in the premises. We hope to learn before long that the matter has been brought to an issue.

There have been many loud complaints of late among local shippers on account of delays in the transmission of freight. One shipper tells of a consignment of pork shipped to Sydney on 17th December which only reached that town on the 29th. A car load of flour was received in Charlottetown yesterday which had been detained for four weeks at Pictou. These are but specimens of many disagreeable experiences.
