The Pas is one of the Hudson Bay forts, situated between Prince Albert and the Hudson Bay, and being the most northern railway town in the MacKenzie district, having a weekly train service. The Canadian Bank of Commerce are just opening a branch at The Pas.

The December number of the University Magazine was issued on Friday, December 2nd. It is made up of 180 pages of text which includes 15 articles, many of them of first rate importance. Amongst the contributors are Andrew McPhail, Stephen Leacock, Principal Peterson, Dean Walton, Professor Alexander, Professor Edgar, Professor Patchett, Professor Macnaghten, Geo. E. Foster, C. F. Hamilton, P. T. McGrath, E. B. Thompson, S. C. Swift and Joseph Gould. The number opens with an editorial note entitled A Voice from the East, which is a declaration that the various provinces of Canada can only be held together in a confederation by the strength of the Imperial tie. Mr. Hamilton submits the word Militarism to a searching analysis, showing what it is, and what it is not. His thesis is that a proper measure of self-defence cannot be construed as militarism. Mr. McGrath of Newfoundland gives a succinct account of the Hague Award. Geo. E. Foster deals with Reciprocity with the United States, and points out the objections to identifying the commercial policy of one country with that of another. Principal Peterson assigns a meaning to the Imperialism and disposes of many illusions which have grown up around the word The Triumph of Fall is an admirable piece of writing by Miss Thompson, in which the beauty and meaning of the Canadian autumn is depicted. Dean Walton publishes an exhaustive study of the contrast between Canada and the United States in the matter of divorce. By a careful use of statistics he presents a picture which must be gratifying to Canadians. Professor Patchett, of Queen's University, has a full consideration of Political Parties in Germany made at first hand, with a fullness which has not hitherto been done in English. Professor Lenoock presents a study in morality under the heading of The Devil and the Deep Sea. Professor Alexandra narrates with great skill The Love Story of Miss Jane Welsh. Venice from the hand of Professor Edgar, is the first of his studies made during his residence in Europe last year. Mr. Joseph Gould sets forth The Limitations of Music beyond the modern composers have wandered. Paper by Dr. Andrew MacPhail, and the subject is "The New Theology."

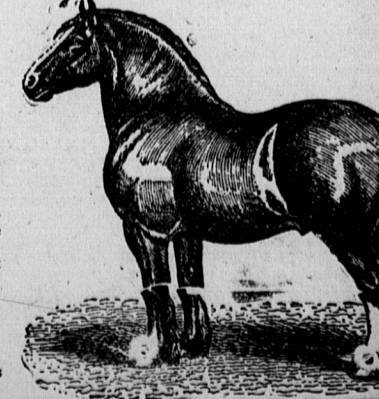
