Critchley, of the Canadian Field Comforts Commission has been granted special leave with permission to proceed to Canada without expense to the public from May until August. A visit from Hon. Lieut. Critchley may therefore be expected in Charlottetown. Captain Plummer acknowledges having just received a donation of 250,000 cigarettes from New York for the Canadian Soldiers.

STANDARD RULES IN FORCE.—Mr. J. D. McNutt, Inspector of Trains and Train Despatcher of all trains from Montreal to Sydney, and Mr. N. Sinclair, Standard Rules Inspector, have been here for some days in connection with the putting into operation on the P. E. Island Railway of the Standard System. The new rules went into effect on Monday morning of this week and everything is working satisfactorily. The system is that which prevails all over America. By the introduction of this system the employees of the Island railway are now placed at an equal advantage with railway men on all other roads being fully qualified in every way to take positions on any railway, having passed a complete examination. Markers are now placed on each train to designate the train and the signals have been changed. Mr. McNutt says that he found the Prince Edward Island Railwaymen all first-class fellows, bright and intelligent, and that they fell in line cheerfully for the adoption of the new rules, and made a splendid showing in the examinations. They were given the exams first by Mr. McLeod, of New Glasgow, and then owing to his absence attending the Order of Railway Telegraphers Convention, Mr. Sinclair was sent over to complete the work, after which Mr. McNutt came to make a final examination of the men, and to see that everything started all right.

ISLANDERS IN CASUALTY LIST

PTE. MALCOLM McBETH.

The following telegram has been received by Mr. John McBeth, Upton: Sincerely regret to inform you Pte. Malcolm McBeth died at Sunny View Sanatorium, in Kamloops, B. C., May 17th, 1917, will be buried at Kamloops, May 18th, with full military honours. Pte. McBeth enlisted at Revelstoke in June 1915. Three weeks later he was sent overseas with a draft from the 54th Battalion, and spent several months in the trenches in the winter of 1915 and 1916. He took a severe cold which settled on his lungs and finally developed tuberculosis to which he succumbed on above date. Great sympathy is felt for his sorrowing father as he has two other sons in the army, James, who was wounded and taken prisoner of war in Germany, but was later exchanged and is now recuperating in a hospital at Toronto, Canada; and Samuel, who also was wounded a year ago and is still in England recovering from wounds.

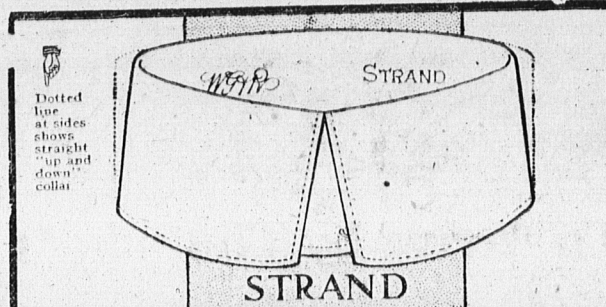

ically reported as having died of wounds in the 6th Casualty Clearing Station on May 16th. The late Private Reginald Rattenbury was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Rattenbury, who left Charlottetown where they had resided for many years, to locate in the West, some years ago. This gallant young soldier was attending the University in Winnipeg when he enlisted in what was called the University's Battalion. He proceeded with the regiment to the front, and after bravely fighting for the Empire made the supreme sacrifice. The sympathy of the whole community here who remember Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Rattenbury, will be extended to them in their bereavement.

It will be remembered that Corporal Simons was badly wounded in the arm, in June, 1916, and spent several months in a hospital in England. At that time he was on military police duty at the Canadian Discharge Depot and had only returned to France less than two months ago.
