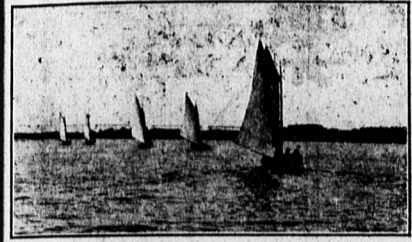


# The Sport Page Everybody Reads

## GREAT SEASON OF YACHTING IS PROMISED ENTHUSIASTS

Seven Additional Yachts Built This Winter Will Be Added to the Already Large Fleet of Sailing Craft. — Twenty-Five and Twenty-one Footers Will Make Their Appearance. — This Class Will Add Greatly to the Interest in the Sport This Summer.

25 ft. over-all and has a 7 ft. beam. The model is the "Barney Google," also owned and built by the above named yachtsmen. If this yacht measures up to the same standard as the "Barney" nuff sed!

"RAMBLER" owned and built by James Roberts and Martin Egan and designed by Pete Roberts. This yacht is the same length as the above, 25 ft. with an 8 ft. beam and is off the same molds as the "Google" yacht, Jim and "Bunny" will bear watching this summer when the "Rambler" does her stuff.

"MYSTERY" Another 25 footer of the Mic-Mac (sam-pan) style with a 7 ft. 8 in. beam and a sail-carrying area of 350 sq. ft. The mystery is designed and built by "Ed" Flynn, designer of the Sheik the speedy little 18 footer which showed lots of class last season. John Lund is the owner and skipper of this craft and it is therefore a safe bet that Jack and his "Mystery" will be there with the head liners when the balmy breezes blow.

Another yacht designed and built by Roberts for John Cameron of P. E. I. R. one of Charlottetown's foremost yachting enthusiasts is of the "Google" type, 25 ft. over-all and 7 ft. beam. As yet Jack hasn't christened his water nymph, but if he handles her in a race with the same mastery he commands in the cab of his engine—"fast time" will be her middle cognomen.

"SEA GULL" owned, built and designed by Miller Mathieson, Mt. Edward Road. This craft is 21 ft. over-all and has a 5 ft. 11 in. beam. Mathieson thinks his yacht will upset the dope when the gun barks this summer.

"WINONA" The only new 18 ft. yacht at present on the stocks. She is owned by Harold Mahar and Gordon Essery, designed by Malcolm Irwin and is being built by "Ed" Flynn. The owners are well pleased with the way their "little dandy" is shaping up and have every confidence that the best in this class will be forced to move fast in order to beat "Winona."

Last but not least, "The Baby of The Fleet," 13 ft. over-all, 4 ft. beam, owned, designed, drafted and built by Capt. John "Happy" Moore. This boat is the most interesting craft of the flock, due to the fact that "Happy" is a bright youth of 14 years who knows the yachting game from every angle and is certain that his yacht when given the opportunity will make the 18 footers look to their laurels. It may be mentioned that John is reported as the youngest designer and builder of yachts in the Maritime Provinces if not in Canada.

The following yachts of last year with the exception of the "Buddy" which met an untimely end last fall, will line up again this season: Emerald J., Byng Boy, Spark Plug, Poltywog, H. B. C., Dingy, Tomorrow, Barney Google, Shick, Swallow and Miss Charlottetown. Everything considered, this summer should experience the greatest season of yachting in the history of the sport on the Island and it is to be hoped that the merchants and every person interested will show heartiest cooperation as the owners of the different yachts have decided to extend an open invitation to tourists and friends wishing a real sailing thrill on Hillsborough Bay.

### FARRELL PICKS THE WINNERS

Readers of the Guardian Sport Page will no doubt remember the up-to-date service given last year during the season in the Big League baseball games and especially the World's Series.

Henry L. Farrell, United Press Sports Editor supplied the "dope" and on nearly every occasion his advance stories proved correct. This year Farrell will again discuss for Guardian readers the chances of the sixteen teams and today makes a prediction of the order in which the aggregations will finish.

In the last four years Farrell has failed only once to pick the two pennant-winners. He picked Cleveland as the American League pennant winner. Since then he has not only been successful in predicting the winners, but he has called the turn practically on every club in the two leagues.
