SHAREHOLDERS OF GRAND TRUNK NUMBER 62,740.

TORONTO, July 17.—According to a statement given to the Monetary Times this week by Mr. E. J. Chamberlain, President of the Grand Trunk shareholders on the company's stockholders naturally varies from day to day and the figures mentioned are the number on the occasion of the issue of the last half yearly report of the company. This number includes the holders of the Grand Trunk five per cent debenture stock and of the four per cent consolidated debenture stock, but not the registered holders of the Great Western and Northern debenture stocks who have no voting power and consequently do not receive the report. The holders of the last mentioned stocks may be taken at approximately 3,000. In 1911 Grand Trunk shares were held by 64,200 persons against 52,900 in 1910. The shares of this road are held almost exclusively in the British Isles. The late Mr. Charles M. Hayes took the Monetary Times in 1911 from 75 to 90 per cent of Grand Trunk shareholders were resident in Great Britain and were resident. It will be recalled that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy gave out recently that the total number of Canadian Pacific common stockholders at present is about 27,000. The number of Grand Trunk shareholders probably come second only to the Pennsylvania Railroad in America, which recently reported 64,689 shareholders.

MARSHFIELD.—The postponed Communion service will be held in the Presbyterian Church at Marshfield next Sabbath at 11 a.m.

TIME EXTENDED.—On account of the late season the time for making entries in the Fields of Standing Grain Competitions has been extended to August 1st. All entries received before that time will be accepted at the usual entry fee, after that date the double entry fee will be charged. Full information can be had from the Department of Agriculture at Charlottetown.

STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL.—The tea and strawberry festival held at Marshfield Wednesday, in aid of St. Columba's Presbyterian Church, on the beautiful grounds of Mr. A. McLaughlin was heartily enjoyed by a large number of people. Tea tables were set in the grove, where there were also booths, at which ice cream, strawberries and other refreshments were sold. The affair was kept up by the moonlight and lantern light until well into the evening.

LONG COURSE.—The Department is arranging for a Long Course in Agriculture this winter to be held in Charlottetown. It will begin about the middle of November and will be concluded early in April. The subjects included in the Course will be: Animal Husbandry; Horticulture; Dairy; Poultry; Agronomy; English; Mathematics; Book-keeping; Chemistry and Economics. The practical work will be given in the Agricultural Building, and provision is being made for Live Stock of all the different classes and breeds, etc. The lectures will be given in Prince of Wales College. A competent staff is already in this Province, and it is expected the course will be quite equal to any First Year's Course in Agriculture given at any of the Agricultural Colleges. A limited number of students only can be taken for the first year, not more than forty-six; as some of the rooms are built and equipped to accommodate just this number. To assist and encourage students to attend this Course a small scholarship will be granted each pupil upon recommendation of Principal of the School of Agriculture, stating that the pupils have attended their classes regularly and have completed their work in a satisfactory manner. It is intended to accept applicants in the order in which they are received, but no applications will be received from boys under 18 years of age. Further information may be had from the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.

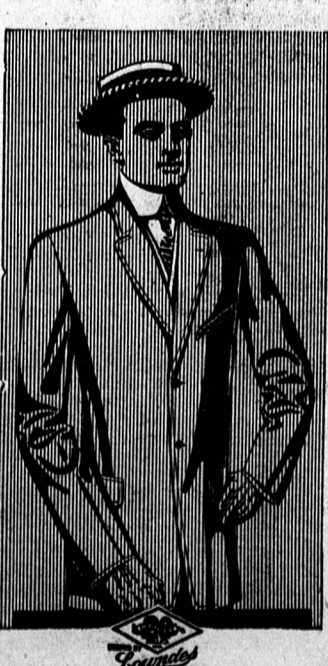
