Giffin has his own crew on board and will sail to Pictou where the schooner will go on the slip to have her bottom examined, as she is leaking slightly probably from a small orifice or spike hole missed when repairing.

CANADIAN TROOPS SAFELY IN ENGLAND

OTTAWA, April 13.—The safe arrival in England of three Canadian troops, with a total of 3,597 officers and men of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces abroad is officially announced through the chief Press Censor's office. The Adriatic, which sailed on March 31, had on board the following troops: 64th Battalion, 38 officers and 1,088 men; 73rd Battalion, 35 officers and 1,033 men; No. 8 Field Ambulance, 10 officers and 181 men; draft Heavy Artillery, 1 officer and 50 men—total, 2,437 of all ranks. The Baltic, which sailed on March 23, had on board the following troops: 56th Battalion (Calgary), 40 officers and 1,073 men; 62nd Battalion (Vancouver), 36 officers and 1,050 men; No. 8 Naval University General Hospital, 38 officers, 45 nurses and 195 men; Canadian O. T. C. Candidates from regular commissions, 45; Naval ratings, 3 officers and 89 men; civilian doctors for army 3; details, 3 officers and 2 men—total, 2,623 of all ranks. The Empress of Britain which sailed on March 29 had on board the following troops: 53rd Battalion, 35 officers and 1,062 men; 74th Battalion, 34 officers and 1,046 men; 75th Battalion, 35 officers and 1,114 men; draft Field Heavy Artillery, 1 officer and 61 men; Medical Corps reinforcements, 4 officers and 144 men—total 3,537 of all ranks. The arrival of the Olympic, in which the Eleventh Howitzer Brigade Ammunition Column under Captain D. A. McKinnon had previously been reported by cable to Charlottetown.

FIGHTING CONTINUES AROUND VERDUN

LONDON, April 16.—The Douaumont-Vaux Sector, northeast of Verdun in the course of another hard fought Infantry engagement between the British and French forces, reports are a variance regarding the result. Paris reports the French captured German trenches and took two hundred prisoners.—Berlin asserts that in the fighting which extended from Fort Douaumont to Vaux Ravine and in which the French attacked the heavy objectives of the French were repulsed. The Germans are bombarding French positions in Avocourt Wood and Hill 304. Considerable artillery activity is also being displayed around Douaumont and Woivre. The British report raiding German trenches while Berlin reports the destruction of a British position about sixty metres in length near Vermelles. There was artillery bombardment various places on the northern Russian line. Further south near Smorgone the Germans started an offensive and were repulsed while south of Olyka Station the Russians in several places made advances. In Sagana Valley and Campo sectors and Austro-Italian Zone Italian have taken Austrian trenches. Austrians fighting regain Sagana Valley positions. Some reports they being maintained under certain fire. Turkey admits one of submarines recently sank Russian Hospital Ship Portugal in Black Sea. Acknowledgements says hospital ship was heavily laden and was towing boats in which were numerous persons toward shore and submarine officers justified believing ship was transport about to land troops and supplies.
