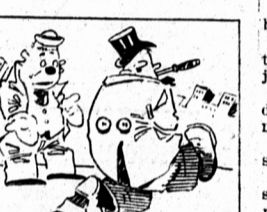

Medium good steers sold for \$6.50 to \$6.70 and the bulk of the common from \$5.50 to \$6.25. The top for good cows was \$5.50. Plain fleshy cows sold from \$4.00 to \$4.50 and canners and cutters from \$2.50 to \$3.50. Bologna bulls sold from \$3.50 to \$4.25 and butcher bulls from \$4.50 to \$6.25. Quotation; butcher steers good \$6.75 to \$7.00 medium \$5.25 to \$6.00. Common \$5.00 to \$5.25, common \$4.00 to \$5.00. Butcher cows good \$5.00 to \$5.50. Medium \$3.50 to \$4.50. Canners \$2.50 cutters \$2.75 to \$3.50. Butcher Bulls \$4.50 to \$5.00. Common \$3.50 to \$4.25. Calf receipts, \$6.27. Common and medium quality calves were from 25 to 50 cents per cwt lower and sold between \$8.00 and \$11.00 with the bulk around \$10.50, a few small lots of good veals were sold for \$11.50 and choice veals were picked out at \$12.00.
