CONSERVATIVES HOLD FUTURE IN THEIR HAND

London Morning Post Discusses Attitude Of Hon. R. B. Bennett On Empire Trade.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Lord Beaverbrook can do nothing in Canada without the Canadian Conservatives, who hold the future in their hand, says the Morning Post today, referring to its own suggestion that in developing his campaign for free trade within the Empire, Lord Beaverbrook should first secure the assent of the Dominions, and particularly of Canada, his native country.
