THE wheat in the Bay View and Cavendish section is said to be almost a total failure from the effects of the joint worm. Most of it will be cut down for hay. Last year some small patches of wheat in this section were destroyed by this insect but this season the damage has become general. When the crop is attacked nothing can be done to save it. Farmers will have to give up trying to grow wheat for a year or two till this insect passes as it likely will. Wheat fields that promised well in the early summer, all at once ceased to grow, as the worm developed in the joint preventing the circulation of sap. Farmers troubled with this pest will suffer a serious loss this year as a considerable lot of wheat was sown.
