PHILADELPHIA, June 6—William E. Carter, one of the Titanic survivors who escaped in the same boat with J. Bruce Ismay, was injured today, probably fatally, at Bryn Mawr in a polo game. Carter had been playing a brilliant game. He endeavored to make a sharp turn when his pony fell. Carter went to the ground his head bent forward and the pony rolled over him. For twenty minutes he lay on the field with three physicians working over him. They were unable to bring him to consciousness, and he was hurried to the Bryn Mawr hospital.

Then by an overthrow to first the Abbies secured two runs which put them one up on the lead and the game ended six to five in favor of the Abbies.

At the police court in Charlottetown yesterday Daniel Gillis appeared on a charge of drunkenness. He was sentenced to a fine of five dollars or ten days and took the days. Josiah Smith, on the same charge, was sentenced to a similar fine but paid up. Bradford King, for fighting on the streets on Friday night was taxed \$10 and costs and in default of payment is to spend thirty days in the new jail. He had not decided up to last night as to his choice.

Just after the criminal assize court adjourned this morning, Reginald Stewart, of Stewart & Charman, introduced the Hon. Mr. Justice Hazard, puisne Judge of the supreme court of Prince Edward Island, and master of the rolls, to Mr. Justice Walsh, who welcomed Judge Hazard in a few well chosen words and said that he hoped he would take a seat beside him on the bench if he was at any time a visitor to the courthouse. The judge was associated in partnership with Sir. Louis H. Davies, judge of the supreme court of Canada, in Charlottetown, P. E. I. He is the joint author of the book Hazard and Warburton law reports, which is used generally in the maritime provinces. He is an authority on common law and equity and was until recently premier and attorney-general of Prince Edward Island. It is the first trip Judge Hazard has made to Calgary and he speaks enthusiastically of the city, especially of the splendid buildings and business blocks in course of erection and already erected. He will remain in the city for a week or two, and will then go to the coast, returning east via the capital.—Calgary Herald.

Samuel J. Young, Willimantic, Conn., aged 66, well known all over New England as a hotel man, died on June 5th at 11.30 p.m. at his home, Young's Hotel, of acute Bright's disease, following an illness since last Friday, although he had not been in the best of health since a year ago last winter. Mr. Young was born in Barnstable, P.E.I., and at the age of 21 located at Tilton, N.H. where he was employed as a dyer in a cotton mill four years. He next went to Lewiston, Me., Olneyville, R. I., Hebronville and River Pt. in succession. He then came to Willimantic and was employed in what was known as Tracy's mill as an overseer, then as superintendent for a number of years. The mill is now known as the Quindick-Windham Mfg. Co. He retired from the mill business and was engaged in the dry goods business in the Marble block on Main Street, under the firm name of Bullard & Young. Twenty-two years ago the 4th of July he embarked in the hotel business, in what is known as Young's hotel, and has since been located there. He was a man of genial disposition, kind and generous to a fault, and was well liked by all who knew him. There survives a widow, a son, Frank E. of this city, a daughter, Mrs. Leander H. Smith of Newport, R.I., a mother over eighty years old residing in Barnstable, P. E. I., and five brothers, Henry of Bristol, John W., Charlottetown, P. E. I., Richard of New York, (formerly of the P.E.I. R.), Wellington of Cornwall, P. E. I., and Seymour of Barnstable. Mr. Young was a member of the Putnam Lodge of Elks, Natchaug lodge, No. 22, K. of P. of this city, the Odd Fellows of Riverpoint, R. I., and an honorary member of the Willimantic fire department.—Norwich, Conn. Bulletin. (The deceased resided his old home in this province last in 1909.)
