**The Call of The Navy**

Friday and Saturday next (August 6 and 7) will inaugurate in every R.C.N.V. Division across Canada a drive for recruits for the Navy.

Surely if ever an appeal of such a nature should meet with a hearty response it should be in this home of good men, Prince Edward Island.

In the Navy all applicants join as Ordinary Seamen and enter one of the Training Establishments such as H.M.C.S. "Queen Charlotte."

"They live in barracks in exactly the same manner as they would aboard ship following the training syllabus laid down for H.M.C.S. ships.

On joining they are provided with uniforms, hammocks and bedding, toilet accessories, etc. Each recruit is attached to a Division, which aboard H. M. C. S. "Queen Charlotte" is named after a former commander of the original vessel. The names of some of these famous sailors are Rodney, Hood, Anson and Howe.

Recruits receive instructions in squad and rifle drill, physical training, boat-work, rowing and sailing, practical seamanship, use of the compass and other aids to Navigation under the tuition of a Schoolmaster and other competent instructors.

They have frequent examinations, the results of which are carefully tabulated and sent to Headquarters.

Command Officers of Divisions have instructions to select suitable ratings as Officer Candidates and submit their names to Selection Board who visit each Division at regular intervals.

On the completion of eight weeks intensive training at "Queen Charlotte" the former recruit, who has now become a smart sailor is drafted to a larger training establishment and receives additional instruction, this time including training aboard a sea-going ship.

But the recruit is ready for draft for sea-service which may take him to any part of the world.

To lads fresh from college the Navy presents a splendid opportunity for advancement. If his conduct and ability meet with the approval of his Commanding Officer he may, after six months service ask for an opportunity to qualify for promotion. With the background of famous sea-faring men, Prince Edward Island has produced and with their record in the present war, there should be no doubt in the minds of young men as to the wisdom of joining the Navy.

The Recruiting Officer of H. M. C. S. "Queen Charlotte" will always be glad to arrange an interview with prospective members of the Silent Service or if weather is unfavourable Saturday afternoon, a naval display will be made by the men of H. M. C. S. "Queen Charlotte" at Park Point, at which the public are cordially invited.

**The Swiss Republic**

Last week there was celebrated the 62nd anniversary of the founding of the Republic of Switzerland, a confederation of twenty-two small states, differing from each other in nearly every way, in language, customs, race, religion, the republic was welded in the flame of freedom. Its nationals forgot all differences in one common passion, hatred of the Hapsburgs, the dictators of the fifteenth century, Hardy and independent, the soldierly qualities of the Swiss are high. Unarmed and unarmed, they were mountaineers, defeated Charles the Bold and the flower of European chivalry. Every king sought to enlist them as mercenaries. Machiavelli prophesied that one day the Swiss would be masters of all Italy.

But the Swiss have no territorial aims. Suited to their habit in the valleys of the ice-clad Alps, their affinity is with spiritual liberty rather than temporal power. Three years ago, when the Nazis were overrunning the Low Countries, there was concern among the people of Switzerland. German troops marched to its frontiers. Traitors were active in the capital, Bern, the British legation staff burned its papers. Food was stored deep in the mountain side and under lakes. When German planes flew over the Swiss promptly gave them battle, shot down three. The Nazis looked at the Swiss peaks and their staunch defenders, and thought again.

Then Italy entered the war and the dream of invasion came again to the intuitive Hitler. Switzerland was divided among Germany, Italy and France — on paper. But the Swiss had a trump card to play and they were resolute enough to display it. Communication between Germany and Italy is through the Alps, pierced by three railway tunnels, of which the Simplon is perhaps the most famous. The Swiss mined these tunnels and then warned the Germans: "The moment one Nazi steps over our border we will blow up the tunnels and where will you go?" Switzerland was not invaded. With the fall of Italy imminent, it is unlikely it ever will be by the present European barbarians. Before the spirit of William Tell the "superman" quail.

**WOMEN'S PAY IN THE ARMY - NAVY - AIR FORCE INCREASED**

Under a new regulation now in force, the basic rates of pay for women in the Armed Forces have been increased by 15% to 30%. You now start at \$1.05 a day. Pay then increases, subject to good conduct and efficiency.

Trades pay has been substantially increased and now equals men's. This is now 25¢, 50¢ or 75¢ a day additional to your basic pay, depending on your efficiency and trade.

Dependents of enlisted women (fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers) are entitled to the same allowances as dependents of service men.

**ENLISTED WIVES OF SERVICE MEN WILL NOW RETAIN THEIR DEPENDENTS' ALLOWANCES**

This means that the enlisted wife of a service man is now in the same position as if she were in a civilian job, with certain limitations.

Women are urgently needed in the Armed Forces. These new rates of pay and other allowances now make it possible for women previously held back by financial reasons, to do their duty by enlisting.
