**DR. ROY DAFOE  
WIDELY FETED  
ON U.S. VISIT**

Visits Institution Where His Nova Scotian Wife Took Training as a Nurse.

F. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—A Nova Scotia girl—a nurse—the wife of Dr. Roy Allan Dafoe, the quiet-spoken little northern Ontario family physician who amazed the medical profession by guiding the Dionne quintuplets through the critical stages of infancy, he stated here today.

Dr. Dafoe during the day lunched with the Henry Street Visiting Nurses here and as he was leaving stated he had been interested in the Henry Street nursing service because "about 20 years ago my wife took her training with the service. She studied nursing at Minnesota, but she was a Canadian girl, from Nova Scotia. Her name was Bertha Morrison." Dr. Dafoe is a widower.

**Widely Feted**

The doctor has taken the eastern United States by storm. Everywhere during his visit which ended Saturday he has been feted. Today following his visit yesterday to President F. D. Roosevelt, he was guest of the Henry Street nurses at the invitation of Mrs. Roosevelt mother of the President.

Sometimes, he told the nurses, he likes one of the quintuplets better than the others, depending on "which one talks to me first" as he enters the hospital at Callander, Ont., in the morning.

"I wish you could see those five little girls," he said. "They weighed less than 10 pounds when they were born and they didn't look much like babies. However, you all know about babies when they are born. Now they weigh over 60 pounds. When I go into the hospital in the morning they coo and laugh and sometimes I like one baby better than the others, depending upon which one talks to me first."

**Human Man**

Chatting with Mrs. Roosevelt, Dr. Dafoe said, "I enjoyed visiting with your son yesterday. He is a fine man, a human man."

"I think he is very human too," Mrs. Roosevelt replied.

The doctor was gay even under the persistence of the photographers for "just one more shot." He has been hounded by photographers and reporters ever since his arrival here last Sunday morning.

Sitting between Mrs. Roosevelt and Mrs. George B. St. George chairman of the women's division of the Henry Street nurses, Dr. Dafoe perplexed obligingly under the heat of the photographers' lights. "It is hotter here than it is up in Canada, I can tell you that," said he.

"I don't like all the stuff you are sending to Canada," he said to the news real men.

"But you said it would be all right," they came back and the doctor slapped everybody on the back and tried to escape being mobbed by women.

Before attending the luncheon the distinguished visitor went to see Cardinal Hayes who gave him a gold scapular for each of the Dionne quintuplets.

"What kind of a stone is Jane's engagement ring?"

"A rolling stone. I had it once."

**Driving Tests For Women In England**

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Presumably on the well-known theory that the female of the species is more deadly, etc., etc., women examiners will conduct driving tests for women motorists in England henceforth. Or maybe the women inspectors have no illusions about their own sex.

The new highway code demands that all motorists who have taken out licenses since April shall pass new tests of efficiency. About 200 women's salaries ranging from about \$1,000 to \$1,100, slightly lower than the salaries for male inspectors.

Both men and women inspectors will be given higher salaries in the London district, but neither class is pensionable.  
About 15,000 applicants have registered.

**WHISTLING SWANS MULTIPLY RAPIDLY**

VANCOUVER, Dec. 15.—(G.P.)—The "whoop whoop" of the whistling swan, heard these days on the Pacific coast, carries a strident note. Fifteen years ago hunters decimated their ranks to such an extent the government prohibited shooting of the great white birds.

On Sea Island and Lulu Island, near here, the birds are multiplying rapidly. They are seen in large numbers and their flights which are so high in the sky the birds often are invisible, are no longer unusual.

They spend their summers in the northern tundras. When the flock gathers in formation and cygnets are ready to fly the flock gathers in formation and starts the long flight to winter quarters in the south. A fully grown whistler measures more than four feet from beak to tail and weighs from 12 to 16 pounds.

Although the name would indicate otherwise, the cry of the old male whistlers resembles a bass horn. The young birds, however, strike a shrill, whistling, sound. There are three flights in this continent—one on the Atlantic coast, a second in the Mississippi valley and a third on the Pacific coast.

**CURE PRODUCTION BUT NOT OPINION PRINCE SUGGESTS**

LONDON, Dec. 15.—"We should be thankful that in this country we enjoy freedom of opinion, freedom of discussion in our books as well as in our speech, and that we can point with pride to a free press," declared the Prince of Wales speaking as master of the Worshipful Company of Stationers and Newspaper Makers, at its annual livery dinner at Stationer's Hall.

Receiving the guests the Prince said that with all the uncontrolled spate of printed matter, the idea of "restriction of production"—an economic theory of which they heard a certain amount in these days—might be favored.

"But restriction of any kind with regard to an opinion, however extreme, is I am glad to say entirely contrary to our belief and our traditions," the Prince continued. "I have always been the first to encourage a growing industry, and if some of the books remain unread and some of the newspapers are returned unsold, binders, printers and many others must have been employed in their production, which in these days is, I suppose, all to the good."

"I have great responsibilities and a great deal of trouble," he proceeded, "and I dream sometimes of the days when archbishops had great power and little responsibilities, whose names I shall certainly not disclose."
