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—PLAN TO STUDY POTATO CONDITIONS IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

—MONCTON, N. B., July 10.—To study the raising of spuds in Prince Edward Island in the hope of improving their own product, a party composed of members of the Pennsylvania Potato Growers' Association will visit Prince Edward Island in August. They will travel via the Canadian National Railways to Charlottetown, and on the return trip will stop at Quebec. Prince Edward Island is noted as a potato producing country and last year was a record one in this respect. The total value of business done by the Potato Growers' Association, on the Island for 1929 amounted to \$2,713,674 an increase of more than \$600,000 over the previous year. In the production of these potatoes, eighteen thousand tons of fertilizer were used.
