POLAND TAKES FIRM STAND

WARSAW, June 14.—The Polish newspapers commenting upon Russia's demands upon Poland growing out of the assassination of Peter Volkoff, Soviet Minister in Warsaw, are unanimous in taking the position today that Poland has done everything possible to meet the assassination situation properly.

The papers declare that Russia's demand that Poland expell anti-Soviet refugees should be conditional upon Russia's expelling the Third International whose activities are described as anti-Polish.

As for the Soviet charges of British anti-Soviet activities contained in Russia's original note, Poland cannot allow herself to be drawn into a controversy with Russia concerning actions of the British Government.

WARSAW, June 14.—Poland deplores that the Soviet has seen fit to send a second, still sharper note despite the fact that the Pilsudski Government has made all possible concessions and showed a conciliatory spirit.

There is no doubt that the tension between the two countries has been further accentuated. The cabinet, however, refuses to consider the Russian step too serious.

Minister Volkoff. The reply, which may be delayed will be polite but firm and practically negative. It will point out once more that Poland has done every thing possible, after the murder of the Soviet.

The Soviets demand that Poland liquidate all Russian anti-Soviet organizations and expel all exiles and other enemies to the red government.

Suppression of adherents of the former house of Romanoff and counter-revolutionists could only be accomplished by Russian methods, that is shooting.

Expulsion of the alleged conspirators would also be impossible, since most of them are now Polish citizens, under the Riga treaty.

Livestock Market MONTREAL, June 14.—Fresh receipts of live stock on the two markets this morning amounted to 50 cattle, 50 sheep and lambs, 840 pigs and 945 calves.

The cattle market continued weak. Buyers did not want thin cows. Common light bulls were \$3.50 to \$4.00, and heavy common bulls \$4.00 to \$4.50.

Common cows were mostly from \$4.00 to \$5.00 with sales very slow. Lots from \$8.00 to \$9.00 and the best from \$15 to \$18 cents and hogs were steady at yesterday's prices.

Packers prices were \$10.00 for thick smooths, \$11.00 per hog bonus on selects, 50 cents per hog cut on chops and \$1.00 per hog cut on heavies. Sows \$8.00 to \$6.50.

Maritimes Ask 10 More Days' Lobster Fishing OTTAWA, June 16.—Numerous representations have been received by the department of marine and fisheries urging the extension of the lobster season by ten days in the district from Halifax east to Point Michaud in Richmond county.

The extension is asked for on the ground of unfavorable weather conditions in the early part of the season. The season in this district ends on June 20. Similar requests and for similar reasons are being received for the district covering the North Shore of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

It is reported that the department is giving favorable consideration to these requests.

Arms Stores (By British United Press) BERLIN, June 14.—In the collars of a Berlin theatre in the heart of the city the police recently discovered a munition dump of 500,000 blank cartridges of the German army type.

Not far away, in the same neighborhood in the storage department of a Berlin forwarding agent, 50 packing-cases were discovered, each containing 1,000 fireballs, partly damaged.

The firm refused all information declaring it to be the duty of the police to find out the consignors.

It is believed that these munitions are part of an old theft from the army, and they were intended to be sent abroad, their probably destination being China.

Veal calves sold from \$7.75 to \$9.25 and one lot of choice veals brought \$10.00. They averaged 170 pounds.

Athletics In P. E. Island In these "hot" days of "Seed Potatoes" "Fertilizers" and "Boxes and elections," athletic development of the youth of our "Garden Province" is neglected and almost forgotten.
