Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties-Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties-Six months residence in each of three years after earning patent also 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. G. War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Notes on Garden Pests issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with the Dominion Entomologist

POTATO BUG

One of the worst enemies the war gardener has to contend with is the potato bug. Where potatoes are well in by this time the overwintered female potato beetles lay clusters of bright orange-colored eggs on the undersides of the leaves. These soon hatch into the well known dark-colored grubs. There are several generations of the insect during the season and both the grubs and the beetles continue to feed from spring to autumn.

The destruction of the beetles early in the season is important. As soon as they are seen to be present the vines should be sprayed either with Paris Green or arsenate of lead. At Ottawa, the following formula has given satisfaction: 8 ounces of Paris Green and 1/2 pound of powdered arsenate of lead to 40 gallons of water. Both Paris Green and arsenate of lead may be used in Bordeaux mixture and if this is done the above proportions are suitable for 40 gallons of the mixture. Poisoned Bordeaux mixture such as this not only destroys potato beetles and grubs but also protects the plants from blight and rot. Applications should be made early in June, when the beetles are first seen; then early in July and again about August 1, 15 and 31.

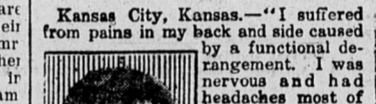
To unseal an envelope without tearing it, wrap a cloth over the flap and run a hot iron over the wet cloth. When the forgotten clipping or photograph has been enclosed, seal the envelope with the white of an egg.
