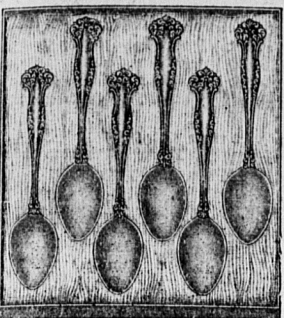

Rev.
