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being taken into account by the Government. "We might," he pointed out, "have gone further than that and followed the example of the other Province and cut out the gasoline rebate altogether."

He had also been attacked by Mr. Maloney for denigrating the oyster industry because, as Minister of Health, he had felt it his duty to issue a warning to citizens as to the danger of contamination of oyster areas in the vicinity of Charlottetown. In this connection the Premier cited from the report of the officials who had made a complete report on the areas, advising of the serious menace to health which oyster fishing in these waters involved. (The report was published in full in The Guardian of March 14.)

The Premier referred to the visit last summer of the Hon. Mr. Durneau, Minister of Fisheries, whom he had accompanied to Rustico where an opportunity was given the Minister of seeing fishery conditions at first hand. The Government has been in frequent communication both with the Minister and the Deputy Minister, Dr. Fould, with a view to aiding the industry. Last fall a special investigation visited the Province on behalf of the Dominion Government

regarding unemployment relief, and the Premier on that occasion pointed out the serious condition of our fishermen. He accompanied the investigator through the three Counties of the Province so that he would have every opportunity of making a first hand inquiry, with the view to impressing this matter upon the Dominion Government.

Again, Premier MacMillan said, the matter had been discussed at the recent conference of the three Maritime Premiers, and the question of freight rates, referred to in the present resolution, was fully considered. The result was the decision to reestablish the Maritime Transportation Commission, towards which the Government is contributing \$1,000.

"I am quite ready and agreeable," the Premier concluded, "to do anything I can to further the interests of the fishermen in this Province. We know that they are suffering. As leader of the Government I promise that this resolution will go to the Minister of Railways and that we will urge the desirability of getting a reduction of express rates that may be of some help to those engaged in our fishery industry."

At six o'clock the adjournment of the debate was moved by Mr. Dennis, and the House adjourned until 10 a.m. today.

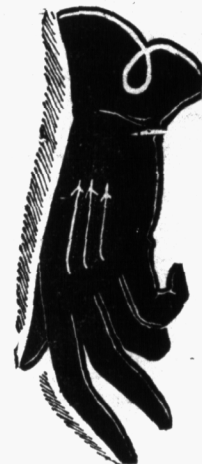
