—LAST POTATO BOAT FOR SUMMERSIDE—After discharging over 5,000 tons of coal at St. John's Newfoundland, the S. S. Pacific, arrived light at Summerside on Thursday morning and after loading twenty-seven carloads of table stock and seed potatoes, shipped by the Harris Abattoir Company of Charlottetown, left on Friday morning for Charlottetown and Georgetown to complete her cargo for the New York market. This is the largest boat that has docked at Summerside this season and was the last boat that will come here for potatoes this fall, as she cleaned up all the potato cars in the yards at Summerside and all shipments from the west of the province will be henceforth sent by rail. The S. S. Minna, which came to Summerside from Crapaud and finished loading at the Marine Wharf left on Wednesday night for New York.

### Fan Belt Tension

The fan belt should be as loose as possible without permitting slipping. A good test is to run the engine at a moderate rate of speed, and then shut off the ignition. The fan should stop with the engine; if it spins, the belt should be tightened.
