BORDEN SPEAKS ABOUT THE JAPS

Says the Question is One For Majority of People in British Columbia, But Japanese Cannot Be Excluded Till Treaty is Abrogated ---Careful About Legislating

VANCOUVER, Sept. 27--(Special)--Last night at Westminster Mr. Borden read a letter from the Asiatic Exclusion League claiming that his utterance was not explicit and asking would he support legislation for the exclusion of Asiatics and what legislation he would propose and would he support the Bowser Act.

Replying he claimed his language was sufficiently explicit. "I have said this is a matter for the decision of a majority of the people of British Columbia."

Watching Trip Of Lusitania

Canadian Government Giving Her Close Attention. All Red Line Project the Reason--No Word From British Government in Regard to Subsidy.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26--The Canadian government is giving close attention to the performance of the new Canadian Lusitania in view of the All-Red Line project. The success of the turbine principle in developing speed is expected to give an added stimulus to the project which Sir Wilfred has at heart and may result in the placing on the route between Canada and Great Britain of steamers of twenty-five knots speed.

THE CHALLENGE WAS TURNED DOWN

Shamrock IV. Not Allowed to Compete For the America's Cup.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26--Sir Thos. Lipton's challenge for a contest for the America's cup in 1908 was declined last night by the New York Yacht Club, Sir Thomas asked for a race for sloops under the 60 foot rule and the members of the club based their refusal to race that the America's cup represents a trophy for the speediest type of yacht that can be produced on a water line length of 90 feet, and that therefore any proposition to limit the size of the boats must be refused.

The members of the New York Yacht Club at their meeting called voted to reject the challenge after Lewis Cass Lydiard former commodore of the club made a speech in which he declared the deed of self governing cup contests as drawn up by Geo. L. Schuyler, in 1857. Mr. Lydiard then put a resolution that the club could not break their rules and could not take the proposition limiting the water line lengths of the boat, Commodore Vanderbilt, chairman of the meeting, appointed a cup committee to convene immediately after the meeting and prepare a reply to the challenge.
