Richard Saw of this City was a passenger to Pictou yesterday en route to Windsor, N. S., at which place he has accepted the position of manager for the Singer Sewing Machine Co.

At the annual meeting of the Laborers' Protective Union, No. 2608 City, the following officers were elected:—

The Halifax Chronicle quotes from The Charlottetown Examiner as follows: "The Charlottetown Examiner says: There are seventeen prisoners confined in the Charlottetown jail at the present time. Of these twelve are doing time for violating the Prohibition law." It might be added that owing to the thorough manner in which offenders of the act have been forced to pay the penalty this City was practically "dry" during Christmas week, and afforded favorable comparison with the capitals of the other provinces, where Prohibition is not enforced.

The M. P. A. A. met at Truro last and discussed a number of important matters. Representatives from New Glasgow, Prince Edward Island, Red Caps, Westville, Stellarton, Moncton, Truro, Crescents, and the Wanderers were present. H. A. Gillie of Cape Breton Union was also present. There was a long discussion over the application of John D. McDonald for reinstatement. The President ruled that the Association could reinstate McDonald, but the delegates by a majority vote declined to accept his ruling. On motion of the New Glasgow delegates the matter was referred to a special committee which met later and after careful consideration the committee agreed to recommend the reinstatement of McDonald. All the other applications for reinstatement were left to a committee to consider. The dispute between the St. Dunstons and the Abegweit teams of Charlottetown was also referred to a committee which will meet at Charlottetown, and report its finding to the Association. With regard to the St. John firemen's tournament, a committee of Islanders was appointed to receive all davits, and the interested parties will then be reinstated. Applications for membership were received from the R. C. R. St. Patrick's, the Resolute and the Victorians of Charlottetown. All were referred to the executive to be dealt with in the customary way. The holding of the Canadian championships in Halifax next year was considered, and if the expenses are guaranteed and the dates made satisfactory to the M. P. A. A., they will take place here. If possible an effort will be made to hold the sports after the Olympia games in London, so as to ensure the presence of all the big athletes. L. B. McMillan, Charlottetown, was the representative from this Province.

In October last The Guardian placed an order with the Mergenthaler Co. Ltd. for two monoline machines to assist in setting up the type for the reading matter and advertisements of the Morning Daily and the Rural Daily. At the same time an order was given for the most up-to-date one horse power gas engine obtainable. The two former arrived the middle of December and the latter a few days later, but owing to the Christmas rush of advertising etc., they are not being installed until now. The tern schooner Gay Gordon was launched last week from the shipyard of Joseph McGill, Shelburne. She is owned by Harvey and sons of St. John's, Nfld., and will be engaged in carrying fish between St. John's and Oporto. She is 161 tons, a very fine vessel, and was constructed under United States inspection. Mr. McGill's yard construction is well advanced on the 90 ton fishing schooner which Mr. McGill is building in his lower yard for Irvine A. Lovitt, of Yarmouth. She will be launched early in the spring. In his upper yard he will begin work at once on a large freight and passenger steamer for which he has a contract from the New Barrell Johnson Iron company, of Yarmouth. She will be 120 feet long, 27 feet wide, and 6 feet in draft. She is designed to accommodate 300 passengers, and is for service in P. E. Island next spring.—Halifax Herald

His Lordship Bishop Worrell of Nova Scotia, recently delivered an address at Halifax on profanity, which has been attracting great attention. The press and other vehicles of publicity are asked to assist in the crusade. In the course of his remarks he said: "The growth of profanity is one of the greatest evils of the present day. The vain use of God's Name, Father, Son and Holy Spirit is shockingly common. Such a thing could not be if people knew God as He is and Jesus Christ, whom He sent to redeem us. Some evils have a certain material result which at first may be gratifying to the perpetrator. The drunkard, the impure man, the thief, the liar, the Sabbath breaker, all these may for a time have some personal enjoyment in the sin before the inevitable evil result has followed. But the profane man has nothing of the kind. He fouls the air, he fouls his tongue, he fouls society and has gained nothing by it. He shows no respect for himself or for others." The Guardian has been requested to draw attention to Bishop Worrell's words, which it does willingly—they are not a bit too severe in their arraignment of a contemptible and unmanly habit—that of swearing.
