Sub-Committees were appointed to deal with the following: Dairying, Herd Improvement, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Marketing, Horses, Cereals, Pastures, Soil and Manure, Horticulture, Exhibitions, Health of Animals, Insects and Pests and diseases.

The Council was organized to bring Government workers and farmer representatives just a little closer together in order to have a better understanding of their problems, and also to co-ordinate all agricultural activities. The formation of a Council of this kind it was felt will tend to promote more effective work and service to agriculture. The Advisory Council will study problems which effect or are essential to the province and will make such recommendations as are deemed advisable to the Minister of Agriculture.

Tuberculosis League Engaged In Great Fight

Education In Home Treatment Seen As Solution To Present Serious Problem. League To Sponsor Christmas Seal Sales.

What is likely to prove a most effective as well as economic method of combating tuberculosis in this Province is being adopted by the recently organized Tuberculosis League. The work of the League is essentially to look after the disease victims in their homes, to contact them in the incipient stages and thereby attack the problem at its source.

Up to the present, most of the money raised by the sale of Anti-tuberculosis Christmas seals has gone directly to support the work carried on in the provincial Sanatorium. Only sixty beds are available for the care of patients in this institution. This is altogether inadequate to accommodate the number of people needing care and supervision.

The Gyro Club and the Women's Institutes are actively sponsoring the home treatment campaign inaugurated by the newly organized Tuberculosis League, under whose sponsorship the sale of Tuberculosis seals this year will be made.

At a recent meeting of the League executive with members of the Summerside T. B. seal sale committee, plans were made for forming a Tuberculosis Society in the Prince County capital which will look after the sale of the seals there. Members of the Summerside organization include Mrs. Thane A. Eden said. "Such a friendship cannot be exclusive; it cannot be directed against anyone else." Informed quarters interpreted this as a slap at Germany's uncompromising attitude towards Russia. "I must comment on the tendency noticeable lately to put the blame on this country for Germany's economic difficulties," Eden proceeded. "This is a doctrine which we cannot for a moment accept. It is not in accordance with the facts."
