Strong Measures Daughters of Empire Hold Monthly Meeting

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The evacuation of the Sudan by the Egyptian army has been begun, says an agency despatch from Cairo this afternoon.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The British cabinet is handling the Egyptian situation in deadly earnest. British United Press learns at noon today that the terms of Britain's final demands upon Egypt were approved at a cabinet meeting this morning and will be dispatched immediately. British troops are already on the way. The British demands upon Egypt will settle in themselves, without reference to the Egyptian government, such outstanding questions as to the security of the Suez Canal, the protectorate of the Sudan, and the rights of foreign minorities.

Time Is Rip
These questions have been in dispute ever since Egypt was granted her independence three years ago, and were to be settled by friendly discussion. Unfortunately the necessary atmosphere that is an essential precedent to friendly discussion has never been obtained with the result that the British have now the opportunity of taking such action as they deem necessary to compel settlement.

It is not the intention of the British Government to take away from Egypt a single shred of their independence although this is the course which the Daily Mail advocates. The Sudan however, will be entirely cleared of Egyptian officials and agitators, and military measures will be taken in Egypt to assure adequate protection for British officials and residents.

FOUR DAYS AT CHRISTMAS

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—The revelations made at the police probe by Mr. Justice Coderre concerning the dealings of Sam Mendelsohn and Morris Mendelsohn, of 93 and 109 Craig street, have resulted at last in striking the city executive to action and their licenses as third-hand dealers have now been cancelled on the recommendation of Inspector Egan, endorsed by Deputy Chief Leggett, who is acting head while Chief Belanger watches the probe.

Mr. Justice Coderre was very pertinent to his remarks about the two Mendelsohns last Friday and publicly called the attention of the chief of police to them, declaring that he was convinced they bought their goods from people who were thieves and whom they knew were thieves and they should not be allowed to have licenses.

If there is no unanimity of opinion among the Dominions as to what action should be taken, an imperial conference will be called, at which the whole question can be threshed out.

Russian Question
The notes to Soviet Russia forwarded by Austin Chamberlain are generally approved here, but it is pointed out in some quarters that such Government must now take steps to establish new relations with Russia.

Moscow may reply that it has no intention of continuing the campaign of propaganda and renew the assurances already given on this score or she may decide to break off relations with Britain altogether.

Press Comment
The British press with exception of the Daily Herald, Labor organ, approved today the Government notes to Moscow repudiating the Russian treaties signed by MacDonald and expressing the belief that the Zinovieff letter was genuine.

Several papers, however, stress their anxiety that pleasant economic relations with Russia be maintained. The Westminster Gazette hopes the Soviet government will understand that all parties in this country desire good relations with them.

The Times says the rather severe note was "pitched in exactly the right tone. The temper of the country, as shown by the elections, demands nothing else."

Favors Moderation Of Volstead Act

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Mrs. Mary Norton, elected to the House from Jersey City, was the first of her sex to be so honored east of the Mississippi. Interviewed after the election she said: "They call me a wet, and I certainly am in favor of some modification of the Volstead Act, although I would not advocate a return of the saloon."

British Liberals Will Inaugurate Democratic Era

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Defeat and declination at the general election has galvanized the Liberal party into an extraordinary effort to recapture its place in public life. The executive of the National Liberal Federation met yesterday when thirty-two members out of the total of thirty-three attended. This is the best attendance in the federation's history and it shows that the Liberal leaders have not given way to despair.

Arrangements were made for a great national conference of Liberals to be held in London in January next. The conference will consist of two representatives from every constituency, three representatives from the various district federations and other representatives from the various Liberal organizations.

It has been resolved to raise £500,000 for party organization and education and for fighting the next election, which it is planned to put at least five hundred candidates in the field to contest the 615 seats.

The fund is to be administered by the executive of the federation, over which the local associations can exercise control. It is considered imperative that an end be brought to the era of secret funds controlled by the central office.

The federation itself must become what was in Gladstone's day an organ for expressing the voice of Liberalism in the constituencies and not a machine for broadcasting the decrees of the central office.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.— A substantial under subscription of the \$100,000,000 French loan, offered today through a nationwide syndicate headed by J. P. Morgan and company was announced when the books were closed forty-five minutes after opening.

him or the local officers of the Company. In everything that it thought could be improved it could expect the C. N. R.'s co-operation and conscientious assistance.

He took advantage of the present opportunity to say what was in his mind for a long time in regard to the kind way in which he had been treated by the Canadian people and especially by the Canadian press. The splendid and unprejudiced support of that organ and its constructive criticism from time to time had alike earned his full appreciation. He could say with conviction that the newspapers of Canada represented higher standards of patriotism and honesty than existed in the press of any other country. He did not believe that in the editorial columns of any of its daily periodicals could be found one word that was subsidized or bought.

He was pleased to come to Prince Edward Island because he marked on every hand evidences of prosperity. The splendid state of farm buildings and all one saw seemed to indicate the contentment and satisfaction of its population. It really had the appearance of the Garden Spot of Canada. This year this Province produced an enormous crop of potato stock. This state of affairs involved the C. N. R. which at once became one of the distributing links in getting rid of this great potato surplus.

That, he would say, was endeavoring to find ways and means to assist this Province in exporting potatoes to the places which they would receive the biggest price. He understood that the city of Winnipeg was very short of potatoes. That was a market that conceivably could be used to good purpose by the potato producers of this Province and he had under consideration a means to open that market to the Province.

Sir Henry said he believed in encouraging the trade with the British West Indies now under consideration. He would like to see a fleet of first class fast vessels sailing out of Halifax, St. John and Charlottetown to West India ports. He was glad to see a representative present last evening. He understood Mr. Kinch was on the island in an effort to encourage that trade. The United States was a self-contained country, producing northern and tropical products. In Canada, immediately adjacent, could be produced only northern products. The lacking products of the tropics could be supplied by the West Indies. If Canada enjoyed that trade she could be just as self-contained as the U. S. It was up to this Dominion here to improve the exchange of commodities and products with her sister Dominions to the South.

Last year the Canadian National Railway system had passed through a critical period in its existence. This year the gross receipts were fifteen million dollars less than last year's but Sir Henry hoped that by the end of this year his company would make just as good a showing as last year.

Speaking of international trade relations he mentioned the distinct business improvements in United States. In spite of the short crop of this country from time to time while these little pilgrimages of different parts. One of the previous speakers had said it was his second visit but he would go farther and say it was his third. He was always glad of the opportunity to come here and hoped that in place of annual visits he could pay two or perhaps three. At any rate it was certain that the importance of the island and its people would eventually ripen into a warm friendship.

Brief speeches were made during the evening by Messrs. J. G. Gardner, D. J. MacDonald, Matthew Lodge, Col. Talbot and S. J. Hungerford.

Confers With Board of Trade
In the early evening a delegation of the Board of Trade and other business men of the city met with Sir Henry Thornton in Supt. Grady's office where questions relating to the double service, freight rates, demurrage, standardization and other matters were discussed. A full report of this conference will appear later.

While here Sir Henry and his party are staying in their train of four steel coaches. It leaves this morning at ten forty-five.

The pair were released on cash bail of \$1,000 each, pending preliminary hearing next Friday.

LOUIS MALVY MAY RETURN
PARIS, Nov. 22.—Louis Malvy, former minister of the interior, convicted of communication with the enemy during the war and banished from France for three years, was voted amnesty in the French senate by 195 to 62.

War Prisoner Now Entitled to Award

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—The Canadian custodian of alien-enemy property has notified W. D. M. Shorley that the former accepts the Polish certificate of citizenship as received by Mike Bodnar from the new Poland. This official consent from Ottawa will enable Bodnar to withdraw from court the \$700 paid to Bodnar's credit in the judgment arising from a boot and shoe partnership here.

Bodnar went to Poland before the war, fought as a conscript in the Australian army, was captured by the Russians, was released by the latter in 1918, and returning to Toronto, sued his partner for an accounting, etc.

Would Give Larkin Status of a Minister

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The latest contribution to the discussion in reference to the reformation of diplomatic machinery between the dominions and the British cabinet is a letter from J. B. Oldham in the Times today.

He points out that the communiqué for August 18, 1918, said: "It has been decided that for the future the prime ministers of the dominions, as members of the imperial war cabinet, have the right to communicate on matters of cabinet importance direct with the British prime minister whenever they see fit. It has also been decided that each dominion has the right to name visiting or resident minister to London to be a member of the imperial war cabinet at meetings other than those attended by the prime minister."

Mr. Oldham suggests this as a valuable precedent for the solution of the present problem of the urgently required strengthening of the imperial diplomatic machinery.

Thus, for instance, if Hon. P. C. Clarkin were given the status of a minister as well as a high commissioner, Canada thereby opens up an avenue of direct communication with the prime minister and is able to direct negotiations short of the delays and circumlocution which is always occurring and hampering the arrangements made through the purely departmental route. Such a change would necessarily have to be safeguarded to the extent that Canadian government and parliamentary ratification would be made a part of such arrangement.
