**TOMMY DANCES WITH JACQUES DURING BATTLE**

Interesting glimpses of how Tommy Atkins and his comrade in arms, Jacques Bonhomme, amuse themselves while under German fire are contained in a letter written by a French soldier at Ypres and printed in the Figaro. The letter is dated November 6.  
"My dear friend," he writes, "We arrived at Ypres one fine morning behind our division and installed ourselves in a big house whose tenants had run away at the first sign of danger. Before us is the beautiful architecture of the market place, while on the square is the hurry and rumble of passing automobiles, of convoys and columns crossing each other, the stir and life of a centre where several divisional headquarters are situated.  
"The English are in the majority. Their officers stroll through the streets correct and phlegmatic, cane in hand. The civilians, numbers of whom still remain, are taking the air, chatting gayly. Only the far off rumble of cannonading tells us that war is going on. Life is beautiful. For two days we have calm—we breathe. Then the following night, a cluster of German shells drop in the town just at midnight, demolishing six houses.  
"The civilians who have remained take themselves to the shelter of the bombproofs they have constructed. These are cold little caves under the heavy walls, and are some twenty yards in depth. At the end, a brick wall, above, a tiny opening for ventilation. Benches and planks strewn about form the furniture, on which they have placed mattresses and covers. The furthest part is reserved for the nursery, where the children are making almost as much noise as the bursting shells. The little ones are playing happily while their parents worry.  
Artillery Fantasy Without Rhythm  
"The shells destined for the town pass over our heads. One hears their approach, which sounds like the siren of an automobile, the rolling of a railroad car on the track or the whistle of the tempest. And two or three seconds after the noise of the explosion resounds. They arrive at unequal intervals; three or four minutes, then interruptions sometimes for an hour. Sometimes isolated shots, five or ten minutes apart. The German artillerymen are playing a fantasy without rhythm.  
To fill in the periods of silence there is the armor of iron which rumbles about under the walls of the town; the largest gun in it hurls its projectiles twenty kilometers. This diabolic engine is manoeuvred by an English sailor who smokes his pipe with an aggravating calm. 'Little Willy,' as the gun has been nicknamed, is a troublesome neighbor, but he does his work well. Every time that the sailor jerks the lever, the roar of 'Little Willy' fairly shakes the walls.  
"Bzz—bzz—plout-plout! Two German 'smoke-pots' burst beside our casemate, causing the first casualty among our men. A soldier barber shaving a comrade neatly clips off the tip of his client's nose as the rear of the bursting shells makes him jump!  
"In such circumstances it is interesting to listen to conversation. One would think that the men would have nothing to talk about but the war, but this is not so. Some are talking shop; others are making projects for the future.  
"But some carry their devil-may-care spirit beyond all limit. At the moment when the shells were raining heaviest over the town an indescribable cacophony came to my ears. It was the bursting of a local musical society, had donned the costumes and were dancing about like madmen while horns brayed and fiddles squeaked. It was the most comical sight I have ever witnessed.

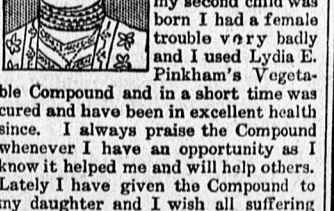
**A DRUMMER'S VALOR WINS VICTORIA CROSS.**

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Two additional Victoria Crosses have been awarded British soldiers for valor on the field of battle. One of them was conferred on Drummer Spence John Bent Ask, of the Lancashire Regiment, who near Legher, "after his officer, a platoon sergeant and section commander, was struck down, took command and succeeded in holding the position."  
On previous occasions the drummer distinguished under a heavy shell and rifle fire and under similar conditions in bringing into cover some wounded men, says the official account of the awarding of the honor.  
The other recipient of the decoration is Lance Corporal Dobson, of the Coldstream Guards, who at Chavannes "brought into cover on two occasions, while under heavy fire men lying exposed in the open."  
Twenty officers have been appointed Companions of the Distinguished Service Order for gallantry in action.

**SAW GERMAN'S KILL MAN WITH EMPTY BOTTLES.**  
MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—Lieut. De Yong, a resident of Verdun, Que., has returned from the battle front wounded in the shoulder, his wound having been received just outside Dixmude. He states that he witnessed a case of German barbarism at Termonde, where a seventeen-year-old girl was forcibly taken away by a German officer while her father was tied to a telegraph pole and made a target for empty champagne bottles until he was dead, and a younger brother of the girl, was tightly bound and thrown to the ground.  
Lieut. De Yong, who was with the Belgian army, stated that in his first experience of shrapnel bursting around him he unconsciously turned up his coat collar to keep the bullets off, as if it were nothing more than a rainstorm.

**BIRTHPLACE OF JOAN OF ARC. MILITARY TRAINING IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.**

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Reports that the Germans have captured Domremy La Pucelle, the birthplace of Joan of Arc, are declared to be untrue in an eye-witnesses' statement from Col. Swinton of the War Bureau, today. The report, dated December 6, says: "For seven weeks there has been no strategy of advantage and no big gains have been made, but time works against the Germans, who are obliged to expend force here which might be used advantageously elsewhere."  
MACON, Ga., Dec. 12.—Military training will be introduced in the public schools of Bibb County, including those of this city, it was announced here today by the county board of education. It is planned to obtain an instructor who has had regular army experience. There are 11,000 students in the public schools, apparently half of whom are boys.
