REFUSE PERMISSION TO DISINTER BODY OF A TITANIC VICTIM

HALIFAX, June 22.—Interesting legal proceedings are in progress in the New York courts in connection with the estate of one of the victims of the Titanic, buried at Halifax, according to a letter received here by the civic authorities ordering that permission be not given to certain parties to disinter the body of one Servando Ovlez Rodriguez. New York lawyers interested state that the estate of the deceased is entitled to "great amounts of accruing by Cuban law if the body is not found." It is alleged that two persons interested in the death of Rodriguez came to Halifax at the time of the Titanic disaster and caused the body of the deceased to be disinterred, but it is now said that one of them refuses to identify the body, hence the reason for asking that no permit be issued allowing the body to be removed.
