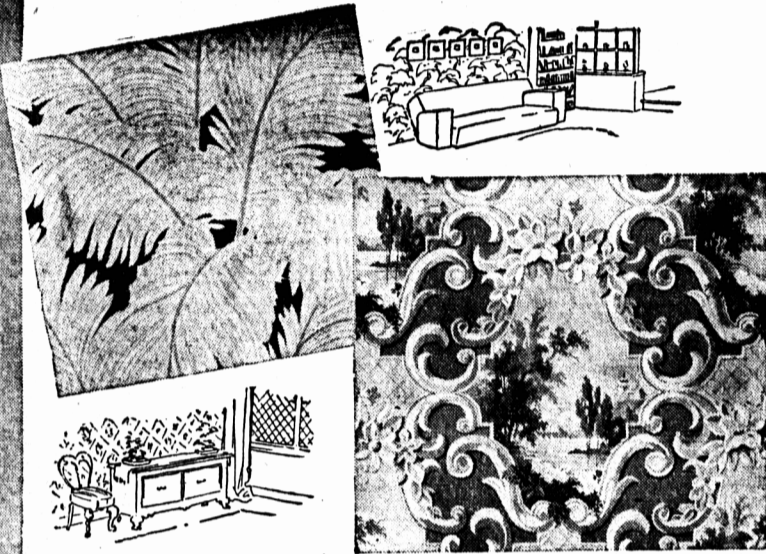


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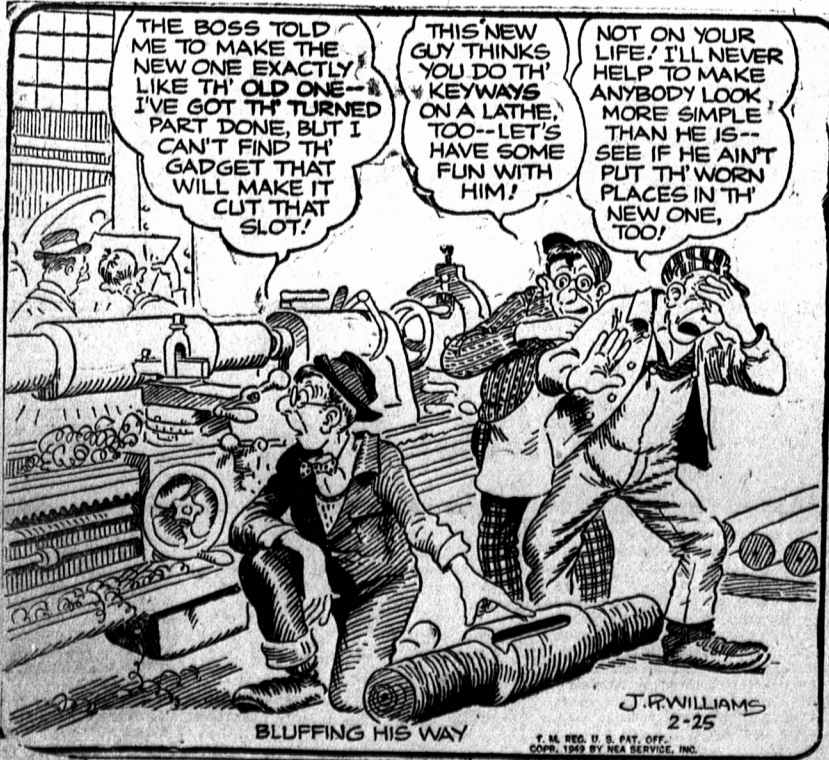

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Guest Soloist

SAKOVILLE, N. B., February 16.—(Special)—Miss Audrey Farnell, popular Canadian soprano from Amherst, N. S., was guest soloist at Mount Allison's Symphony Orchestra Concert in Charles Fawcett Memorial Hall on Tuesday, February 16.

Miss Farnell was a prize winner on the "Singing Stars of Tomorrow" a few years ago and since then she has established a reputation as one of Canada's most outstanding vocalists.

The attractive programme consisted of Mendelssohn's Ruy Blas Overture, Haydn's "Surprise" Symphony, Finlandia (Sibelius), Sleeping Beauty Waltz (Tchaikowsky) and Orpheus in the Underworld (Offenbach). The Orchestra includes approximately thirty players, drawn from the staff and students of Mount Allison and the towns of Sackville and Amherst and the city of Moncton. The group is under the direction of Prof. Harold Hamer, with Miss Doreen Hall as concert master.

FORMER AERIALISTS QUEEN DIES

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Improved Auto Travel Aim Of Association

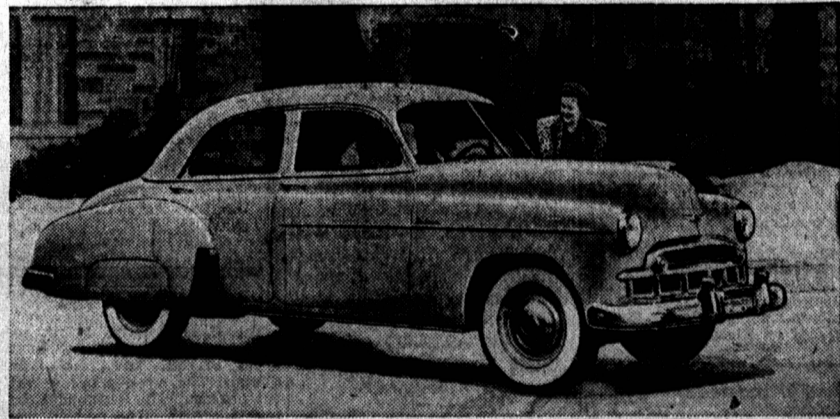
The P. E. I. Automobile Association is growing rapidly and its officers are making plans to suggest ways and means to the government for easier, safer and less costly road travel. In an interview yesterday with the President of the Association, Mr. E. C. Baker, it was learned that the following suggestions will be made to provincial and municipal authorities:

A Safety Responsibility Plan which would provide adequate compulsory insurance of all vehicles for public liability and property damage.

A Youth Safety Plan to teach school children (motorists of the future) safety rules of the road.

Road direction and warning signs suggestions to assist provincial and municipal authorities in determining location and type of signs best suited.

Mr. Baker said the P. E. I. Automobile Association is affiliated with the Canadian Automobile Association and with the American Association. The primary purpose of the association is to enable the motorists of the province through collective action to bring about improvements in motoring and tourist conditions. A strong association, he believed, could do much to influence the making of fair laws and regulations governing the taxation and use of motor vehicles.
