**Cars Collide On Bridge, Five Persons Drowned**

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—Five people are thought to have been drowned when two automobiles crashed tonight on Pont Des Cedres which spans the Soulanges Canal near Outreau Landing about twenty five miles from here. One car with all aboard toppled in the water. Three hours after the accident searchers had pulled from the canal the bodies of an unidentified man and woman. They were continuing their task on a report that the submerged machine had contained five persons.

**Miners Deaths Not Due to Poisoning Says Houdini**

Dr. W. J. McConnell of Philadelphia, a physiologist of the United States Department of Mines, who examined the stage magician and opponent of spiritualism before and after the experiment, reported that physical reactions from the test were not marked. Houdini said that he felt only a slight dizziness when he was released from the coffin. Dr. McConnell expressed himself amazed with the demonstration, and expressed the opinion that Houdini's theory might cause important changes in safety methods in mines.

It was computed that there were 34,398 cubic inches of air in the coffin. The oxygen in it according to the physiologist, should have been all used up in three or four minutes, so that Houdini breathed "close" air filled with carbon dioxide for 86 minutes.
