TORONTO, Sept. 12.—For the first time in history, Ontario peaches will be offered in large bulk on the English market this season. A shipment of 1,000 cases of the finest Niagara fruit is to leave for Montreal next week, and will be in England ten days later. Later on the department hopes to make a similar big apple shipment venture.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—A despatch to the Express from Berlin says the Countess Von Bluecher, formerly Alma Leob, of New York has been robbed at a hotel in Kreuznach, Rhineland Prussia. The thieves broke into her room and chloroformed the Countess and took from her £1,250. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Berlin says the Countess was found in bed unconscious from chloroform and that her jewels had been stolen from beneath her pillow.

FINDS BROTHER AFTER QUARTER OF A CENTURY

BOSTON, Sept. 11.—William H. Harrington, aged seventy-five, a mason and plasterer, of East Boston, has located his brother, John P. Harrington, of Clyde River, Shelburne Co. (N.S.), whom he had not heard from for twenty-five years. The Nova Scotian was located

through a clipping in a Portland paper sent to William by a friend residing in Portland. The Harrington home was in Portland. —NEW SIDEWALK.—The cement sidewalk on the east side of Broadway North, Kensington, from its abrupt termination at School street, has been extended north to connect with C.M.B.A. Hall, or Strand Theatre. This supplies a very important but too long a missing section which has at least impressed the civic authorities with definite results. The need was most firmly pressed by Councillor Donohue, who demonstrated that longer delay would be detrimental to civic interests, and that a need so beneficial to consistent progress must be supplied. That wizard of cement, Mr. W. D. Sutherland, who can make adhesives cohere, performed the work, and the footfalls now upon it will be repeated a century hence before the work will need renewal. And this says something for the traffic on this section of Broadway is assuredly the most important in the town.

OTTAWA'S ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE WEST

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—"Immigration and development of our natural resources are essential to the progress of Canada and to the solution of many national problems," declared Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, in discussing tonight his recent Western tour. That a national and aggressive immigration policy has been developed and will shortly be announced, is definitely known. "Capital is requisite for development, especially in Western Canada, where the great natural resources furnish a great field for intelligent investment," Mr. Stewart stated. "The Government is prepared to encourage investment for development, but not for exploitation and stock-mongering."

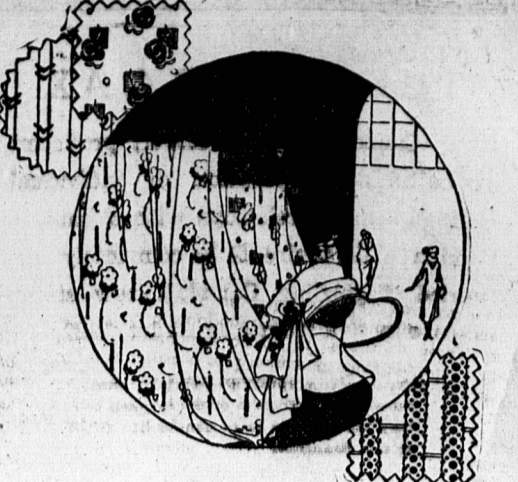

CONVERSION PROPOSALS

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE offers to holders of these bonds who desire to continue their investment in Dominion of Canada securities the privilege of exchanging the maturing bonds for new bonds bearing 5 1/2 per cent interest, payable half yearly, of either of the following classes:—

- (a) Five year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1927.
- (b) Ten year bonds, dated 1st November, 1922, to mature 1st November, 1932.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by bank to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form, carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue, which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.
