**Youthful Blind Student, Musician**  
Halifax may soon have another bright star in the firmament in the person of 15 year old Ivan Gillis. Ivan is a blind boy student at the Halifax School for the Blind. At the recent graduation exercises Ivan was one of the major prize winners.  
Fine Musician  
Under the tutelage of Prof. J. Hollis Lindsay, Ivan has set an exemplary record in the study of music. He is an accomplished pianist and has on two occasions been one of two winners in a Dominion-wide exhibition held under the auspices of the Trinity College of Music of London, England.  
In his junior year, 1931 Ivan was one of the two Canadian prize winners and this year he duplicated that feat by winning in his senior year. It is believed to be the first time that any pupil has ever won an exhibition in Canada on two occasions. Ivan completed his senior studies this year at the School and ranked second highest in his class. This entitled him to second prize in the Literary department. In the music department Ivan took the prizes for boys under 15. Other prizes were for "Most Improvement in Typing"—1st and the prize for "Braille Reading" for pupils over 15.  
Heard in Recital  
During the graduation exercises held at the School, Ivan gave a short recital playing a special composition of Professor Lindsay's. A large audience as well as His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Covert and the members of the School's Board of Governors sat spellbound while the short fingers of a small blind boy flashed back and forth over the ivory keyboard of a piano. Rippling and swelling the notes of a difficult and specially prepared composition floated through the stillness of the large assembly hall. Music critics were indeed loud in their praise of the ability of the 15 year old lad. A career in the world of music is predicted for the talented blind boy. Next September when the School re-opens will find Ivan eager and ready to continue his studies under Professor Lindsay.  
Will Try Organ  
Ivan will attempt to master the big organ in the assembly hall of the School, which is well known to radio listeners as the mighty organ of the Harbor Light, program broadcast over Radio Station CHNS.  
Ivan is a son of John M. Gillis employed in the office of the Provincial Deputy-Treasurer and resides at the home of his parents, in Halifax, at 42 Queen Street. When he has completed his studies in Halifax, his father intends him to study in Europe under the best music masters.—Halifax Herald.
