Five Rinks Continue Unbeaten Into Fifth Round Of Tankard Play

TORONTO, March 7.—Curling history was written today at the 1938 Macdonald's Brier competition as five rinks from Manitoba, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Ontario and Northern Ontario advanced without a defeat into the fifth round of the Canadian Curling Championships.

The winners withstood determined third and fourth round bids by Alberta, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island to break into the win column in the round-robin for the title Manitoba has held eight times since the Brier was inaugurated 12 years ago.

Close Matches
Bob Cream's Quebecers and Howard Palmer's Albertans came within an ace of scoring third-round wins, Quebec extending the veteran Roly David's rink from British Columbia to an extra end, Alberta coasted to a sparkling finish against Manitoba but its rally was just short of the mark.

Northern Ontario, led by the scientific skip, Dan Miller, turned back Quebec 14-9 after trouncing R. F. McLaughlin's Prince Edward Islanders 17-3.
