Mrs Millar, Alberton, is visiting her father, T. C. James, City.

Tomorrow night the big masquerade skat takes place at the Arena. Don't forget it.

A budget of news has been received from Portage which awaits the senders name in confidence.

At the Arena Rink Saturday night a team comprised of Commercial Travellers defeated Prowse Bros team by a score of 2 to 0.

Dr and Mrs H. D. Johnson, City, drove to Eidon yesterday to visit Mrs Johnson's mother, Mrs D. A. McLeod, who met with a slight accident.

Dr Heartz formerly of this City, is assisting in a missionary campaign this month in Nova Scotia. Rev J. L. Dawson, and Rev Thos Marshall will also take part.

Thomas Waugh of North Bedouque came to the city on Saturday on his way to attend the meeting of the Canada Seed Growers Association at Ottawa. He crosses by the Minto this morning.

The coldest temperature recorded Saturday was twenty-seven degrees above zero and the highest was thirty two above up till nine p. m. The coldest recorded the previous night was twenty-four above.

The Co-operative Fruit Company begin the packing of apples this morning. About 500 bbls of Ben Davis apples were brought in on Saturday and it is expected that quite a number of bbls will come in today and tomorrow. This is an excellent opportunity for fruit-growers to ship their Ben Davis apples.

A good deal of driving was indulged in and around the town on Saturday and yesterday, the streets in this city and throughout the adjoining country being in good condition. On Saturday two accidents were reported, one resulting in a broken shaft and happening to a horseman who was driving a spirited young animal, while in the other case the sleigh was considerably broken up.

The annual meeting of the Cherry Valley Dairying Company was held in the hall at Cherry Valley on February first. The secretary's statement showed, that the factory opened on the first of June and closed on the 31st of October. Milk was supplied by forty-six patrons, quantity 550,373 pounds, quantity butter-fat 19,355.88, butter manufactured 22,408 pounds, total receipts \$5,310.30, expenditure \$1,222.16. Of this amount, \$711.56 was paid back to patrons for milk drawing and other work supplied, allowing 13 cents per 100 for skim milk, would make an average of \$1.20 for whole milk, besides paying off \$304.00 debt on factory.

William F. Brown, who has operated the factory for the last four years, talks of leaving, which is to be regretted, as he has given good satisfaction, and his butter is second to none, bringing highest market prices. The business of the season was completed by appointing directors for the ensuing year, the vote taken resulting in many of the old directors' re-election—Charles Mutch, Francis Mutch, Malcolm McLeod, Francis Mutch, William Carey, John Tweedy and Alex. McDonald. W. I. Young was appointed auditor for the coming year. This company was formed seven years ago, built an up-to-date factory, furnished with modern improvements, at a cost of about \$2,800; retained 5 cents per 100 on milk supplied as their system of payment. This year finds them with only \$207 debt, with no one seemingly the worse, and a few more the wiser.

She brought over twenty-five passengers, eighty-five bags of mail one car of English goods and two cars of mixed freight. The Earl Grey crossed to Pictou.

The ourward cargo by the Minto to Pictou today will include two cars dressed hogs, one car smelts and two cars way freight.
