Nine Directors Of Soviet Rwy. Are Dismissed

MOSCOW, July 21—Nine of the ten directors of the Soviet Railway system were dismissed today as a result of recent exposures of gross inefficiency and mismanagement. A complete re-organization of the transport system is planned. A. Andreyev, Commissariat of Transport and a member of the powerful political bureau, was the only member of the board who remains in his post. Five assistants were also discharged. A government decree created a special department to improve the quantity and quality of the transport workers' food, the neglect of which was declared responsible for unrest among the men. Thousands of specialists and engineers have been shifted to other posts and wages increased up to sixty per cent.

Captain Boyd Visits Canada In Famous Aeroplane



One of Canada's most famous airmen dropped out of the clouds and set his veteran aeroplane down at Barker field, Toronto, July 15. J. Boyd flew from New York with his wife, bringing with him the veteran Columbia, oldest and most famous ship still in the headlines.

Sees Great Future For Oyster Industry Under Leasing Policy

Improved Prospects For Sale Of Pickled Cured Codfish And Other Reassuring Signs Note By Visiting President Of Maritime - National Fish Limited

Prospects for far-reaching success in the oyster industry in Prince Edward Island under the Dominion Govt. area leasing system are seen by Mr. Alfred H. Brittain, President of the Maritime-National Fish Limited, of Montreal, who is here on a short vacation. Interviewed by a Guardian representative yesterday, Mr. Brittain said he was convinced this was the only feasible method of rehabilitating the industry, and that while time is required for success, the ultimate benefits to the industry are beyond doubt. Emphasis must be placed, he said, on standards of quality and package as well as production output. He pictured the time in the not far distant future, when, if the Dominion Government policy of oyster farming is adhered to, Prince Edward Island oysters will have largely replaced the United States product in Canadian markets, and the demand will be such that the industry will take its place as one of major importance to the Province.

Notes Great Improvements "I see great improvements on the Island since my last visit over fifteen years ago," Mr. Brittain declared. "You should have a big steamer trade; and with improved transportation by road, water and rail, nothing can hold back the tourists from this delightful Province."

Mr. Brittain arrived here on the S. S. Fort St. George. Every effort, he believed, should be made to encourage a continuation of such splendid service as this steamer is providing. Another inestimable asset to the tourist trade is the fine accommodation at the Canadian National Hotel, which he described as a first class investment to the Province.

Mr. Brittain, who is a past president of the Canadian Fisheries Association and has wide acquaintance with conditions of the fishery industry from coast to coast, is enjoying his first vacation for many years. Accompanied by Mrs. Brittain and his youngest son, he is enjoying every minute of his stay in Prince Edward Island and regrets only that business will prevent him from remaining here for any length of time.

Quebec A Competitor The Province of Quebec has become a keen competitor of both Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, especially during the summer months, in sea fish for shipment fresh to Montreal. This is a point which local producers should bear in mind and which, Mr. Brittain suggests, should be a stimulus to increased efforts at quality production.

People in the larger centres of Canada are realizing more and more the value of sea food, not only as a palatable diet but from a health-building standpoint as well. In this connection Mr. Brittain mentioned the splendid campaign carried on by the Dominion Government through Miss Evelyn Spencer, who has been touring Canada and is now in the Western Provinces, demonstrating the proper methods of cooking fish. Questioned regarding his opinion

of the proposal for a second lobster fishing season as an aid to fishermen in this Province, Mr. Brittain said that while such measures might have a remedial effect on employment, the tendency would be to affect adversely the export trade. Foreign buyers, he believed, would be less eager to purchase Island lobsters in the event of the Government establishing a second season, and the question is whether this would not more than offset any immediate advantage which the fishermen might derive. Simultaneously with the organization of this branch another interesting development is taking place. His Excellency, Bishop O'Sullivan heard of a visit which Colonel Bovey had paid to St. Francis Xavier University and some convents in Nova Scotia with a view to stimulating craft work. The Bishop at once thought that some of the Sisters of St. Martha might well give some study to weaving in order that they in turn might teach others. As a result two of the Sisters are proceeding to take a short course at Trois Pistoles, Que., where weaving is practised by a large group of farm women. The development of a local hand made tweed industry in British Columbia, Quebec and New Brunswick is already notable—this move on the part of the Sisters of St. Martha will, without doubt after a period, result in a similar development here.
