### CABLES

The first attempt to lay an Atlantic cable was commenced at Valentia, in Ireland, fifty-six years ago today, August 5, 1857. After the first few miles had been laid the cable snapped. This break was soon repaired, but six days later, after 300 miles of wire had been laid out, it snapped again, and the vessels returned to Plymouth. A second attempt to lay the cable failed through a violent storm, but the third voyage was successful, and the junction between the two continents was completed by the laying of 2,050 miles of wire between Valentia and Newfoundland. On August 5, 1858, just a year after the beginning of the great project, the first two messages, from the Queen of England to the President of the United States and his reply, went over the wire. There was great rejoicing on both sides of the Atlantic, but it was premature, for within a month the cable ceased working, owing to faulty insulation. After another failure, a successful cable was laid in 1866. The original projectors of the Atlantic cable were Cyrus W. Field, Peter Cooper, Moses Taylor, Prof. Morse and other American capitalists.

### BOLTON HALL.

"Three Acres and Liberty" is the lure held out to the city-dwellers by Bolton Hall, the literary laureate of the "back to the land" movement. The eminent lawyer and chief advocate of the "little land and a living" movement was born in Ireland fifty-nine years ago today. His father, the Rev. John Hall, was the eminent Irish-American Presbyterian clergyman, Bolton Hall's youth was spent in Dublin, and he was thirteen when his father came to America in response to a call from the Fifth Avenue Church. The son graduated from Princeton, and for many years practiced law, but abandoned that profession to devote his entire time to the propaganda of the reforms in which he is interested. He has travelled all over Europe investigating the small farm system. He has not been content with writing books about his pet theory, but is himself a practical farmer, and has demonstrated by the sweat of his brow that a little land can bring liberty and a living to the worker. His plan he believes, offers the solution of the "high cost of living" problem that is now vexing the dwellers in cities.

### G. E. RITCHIE WINS LOUSON MEDAL

Mr. W. S. Louson's silver medal for award to the first rifleman on the Island making 100 points over the 200, 500 and 600 yards ranges, whether at practice shooting or in competition, has been won, and perhaps sooner than was generally anticipated. The successful rifleman is Mr. G. E. Ritchie, who should be justly proud of his achievement, for it is not yet a fortnight since the medal was put up for competition. Yesterday afternoon, however, Mr. Ritchie by some excellent shooting settled its fate. He made exactly the hundred. The occasion was a spoon shoot for the members of the Civilian Rifle Club, of Charlottetown, and the fourth Regiment Rifle Club, respectively; it was as a member of the latter club that Mr. Ritchie shot.

The weather conditions were fair. The wind was light and steady, only the light was dull. However, Mr. Ritchie started in splendid fashion—at the 200 yards he made 33 pts.; at the 500 yards, he just missed the possible by one point. He came back to the 600 yards with the fine total of 67 pts. out of 70. His first three shots at the longest and most difficult range resulted in two inners and a bull, and it was realized that he wanted all bulls-eyes with his remaining four shots to get the hundred and the medal. The excitement was intense when he put on three bulls consecutively. His last shot was watched with almost breathless interest by all on the range; the coolest man among the lot was the rifleman himself, and necessarily so. When he fired and the white square promptly came up, indicating that he had got the bulls-eye, that he had made his hundred and also won the Louson medal, a great cheer went up from those around. Three hearty cheers were immediately given for the winner, who deserves to be warmly congratulated upon his fine achievement. City rifle-men are proud that the medal will remain in Charlottetown, especially as competition was keen among the other Island shots to secure it.

Mr. Ritchie's excellent performance created a vacancy which it is The Guardian's great pleasure to announce has been immediately filled. Professor P. Barlow, President of the Civilian Rifle Club, now gives a silver medal on exactly the same conditions as those made by Mr. Louson; the medal to be won by the first rifleman making 100 points or better at the three ranges already named, whether at practice shooting or in a competition. Such sportmanlike acts are worthy of the highest commendation. With regard to yesterday afternoon's shoot there were several good scores besides Mr. Ritchie's. Mr. Alex. McKinnon made 96 pts., as also Mr. F. Kennedy, while Mr. G. R. Beer made 94, and Mr. J. Landrigan 94. Mr. Beer though making top score in the Civilian's shoot did not win the spoon for "A" class, as have

### ENGLAND'S AGED PEERS.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The Earl of Wemyss, the oldest member of the British peerage, celebrated his ninety-fifth birthday anniversary to-day. Besides Lord Wemyss there are two other nonagenarian peers. They are Lord Strathcona, who at ninety-three is still devoted to his duties as High Commissioner for Canada, and the Duke of Grafton, who was born in 1822, and who succeeded his brother, the sixth duke, in 1882.

### MASONS MEET IN VANCOUVER.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 4.—The Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada, the governing body of the Masonic "Order of the Temple," began its annual session here to-day, the meeting being the first that the order ever has held in the far West. Many of the delegates from the East will return home by way of Denver, where they will attend the Knights Templars' triennial convocation next week.

### HEAD OF TRAPPISTS PASSED AWAY.

MONTREAL, August 3.—Growing so weak towards the end that the rigorous Trappist rule that every member of the order shall die on the floor amid sack clothes and ashes, was vfor once dispensed with, Right Rev. Dom. Antoine Oger, E.C. R., the famous head of Canada's most picturesque branch of the Trappist order, died here last night. His death for two weeks was regarded as only being a matter of hours, but the mighty spirit within the frail body fought off for days the final passing. Two weeks ago he was carried on his bed into the monastery chapel to witness the religious exercises attendant upon the celebration of the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. He was made abbot in 1902. The monastery at Tracadie, N. B., was for a time under his regime, but it was given to the monks from Brittany, France.

### PRIZE PHOTOGRAPHY.

The handsome silver medal awarded by the 1912 Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition, as 1st, prize for "Three Marine Views" has just arrived for the winner, Miss Rose Stanway, who did not know she had won it among her other prizes. Two of the views were of ships in Charlottetown Harbor and one a scene in Pictou Harbor. Heartly congratulations are certainly due this young amateur photographer.

### LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEERS IN SESSION.

MONTREAL, Aug. 4.—For the first time in ten years Montreal is entertaining the annual convention of the Canadian division of the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The meeting assembled to-day and will continue in session until Thursday. Prominent among those in attendance is Warren S. Stone, of Cleveland, the Grand Chief of the Brotherhood.

### Canadian Associated Press.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—During the debate on the Colonial Office vote in the House of Commons last night, it was announced by the Right Hon. Lewis Harcourt, Secretary of State for the Colonies, that cable rates with the West Indies will be reduced. He agreed that the West Indies had suffered very much from their present cable rate to this country, which varied from 4s 2d to 5s 6d per word, a rate which was causing to telegraphic communication and commercial development. After careful arrangements with the Postmaster-General, they had concluded Irish arrangements.

At present, continued Mr. Harcourt, the West India Islands contributed \$1,500 a year towards cable service, and it seemed unreasonable to ask them for more. They were informed that better rates could be obtained if \$80,000 a year were added to that subsidy. The amount had been found half by the British Government, and as he had just learned from the Right Hon. R. L. Borden, the other half by the Canadian Government. (Cheers.)

As a result of this arrangement, said Mr. Harcourt, cable rates between the West Indies and the United Kingdom would be reduced to 2s 6d (sixty cents) per word. The cable company were also going to continue the deferred rate for plain language terms at half the normal rate, and they were going to reduce the press rate to one-half the new ordinary rate without deferment.

The cable company, added Mr. Harcourt, further undertook to retain an absolutely British directorate and management. It was also stated that the rates between the West India islands themselves would be reduced by one-half, with a maximum rate of 1s 3d a word and a minimum charge of 1s per telegram.

### DATES BACK TO WEST INDIAN AGREEMENT.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—The cable report that Canada is hearing part of the cost of reducing the cable rates to the West Indies may be accepted as well founded, even though no negotiations to that end have not reached a final conclusion. It all dates back to the West Indian trade agreement. It was pointed out at the time those negotiations were in progress here that there were two main obstacles to the development of Canadian West Indian trade. One was the poor steamship service, and another the almost prohibitive cable rates. In some cases the rate from Halifax is a dollar a word.

The trade agreement was concluded, and in carrying it out the steamship service has been improved and will be still better. To reduce the cable rates is the remaining obligation of the agreement, and this will be carried out next. The governments will likely subsidize the cable companies for the loss of revenue incidental to the proposed material cut.

## WAGE INCREASES GRANTED ON I.C.R.

HALIFAX, Aug. 4.—The men of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees on the intercolonial railway, who have been asking for an increase in wages have been notified by the general manager of the government railways that their demand will be practically acceded to. It became known to-night that a letter to this effect had been addressed by the management of the railway to A. H. Mosher, Halifax, the head of the brotherhood, which includes the men interested. The increase is equal to about 10 per cent., will aggregate \$120,000 a year, and applies to some 2,000 employees. Not only is this increase granted, but it is to date back to March 31st, at which date the old board of management had offered increases, and in many instances the new schedule shows a considerable advance over the amount of increase then proposed.

As regards the confidential clerks and stenographers they also will be given an increase fully in line with that granted to the other men affected.

The official notification from Mr. Gutelius, as quoted here, is as follows:—

MONCTON, August 1. Mr. A. R. Mosher, Grand President Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, Halifax.

Sir—Acknowledging your letter of July 28th, and having reference to my letter of July 28th, to Chairman H. B. LeBlanc, I beg to advise that upon submission of proper credentials I shall be glad to open negotiations with the general officers of your organization for the purpose of entering into a new schedule with the employees whom you represent.

I shall be pleased to meet you at Moncton on Monday, August 11th.

To relieve the anxiety of the employees as to our good faith and to ensure that they are not any longer held out of the money due them for the increases we offered, it is decided that they be paid back time in arrears payroll for the back time increases agreed upon. Such increases to date from March 31st, 1913, as promised by the late board of management.

I am also arranging to grant increases for the remaining employees, including station baggage-masters as offered. The clerical staff and stenographers will also be increased according to the character and responsibility of the work performed by them, and as recommended by the heads of their respective departments. Such increases to date also from March 31st, 1913.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 4.—The Caminetti-Diggs white slave case, which has attracted wide attention because of the allegations that political influence had been employed to have the Department of Justice at Washington delay the prosecution, will be called for trial to-morrow before Judge William C. Van Fleet in the United States district court.

### MILLIONAIRE COMMITS SUICIDE.

SHELKIRK, Man., Aug. 3.—Arthur Stewart, aged 49, one of the most prominent financiers in Western Canada, founder of the National Trust Company, Limited, and formerly director and manager of that institution, was found by his wife at 6.30 yesterday morning lying on a couch with a bullet hole through his temple and a 32-calibre revolver lying on his breast. Mr. Stewart had been complaining recently of heart trouble and worrying considerably over imaginary financial troubles, which is the only cause that can be assigned for taking his own life. At the time of his death Mr. Stewart was rated at \$1,000,000.
