RIBBON CANE WINS FEATURE FREDERICTON, July 30. - Massachusetts horses took two of the four races on the closing day of the Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club's midsummer racing here this week, passed a resolution urging the members of the fall fairs' section of the circuit to offer a series of races for colts in connection with their racing program this season.

A World's Record OTTAWA, July 30. - What is claimed to be a world record was created yesterday with the arrival of a shipment of 300 White Leghorn baby chicks from the University of British Columbia one hundred per cent safe and sound and very hungry.

Hatched on Saturday the chicks were shipped on Sunday by express and had no feed or water on their 200 mile journey across the continent. The chicks were placed on exhibition at the World's Poultry Congress now meeting here.

Plot to Blow Up "Holy Stair" (By British United Press) ROME, July 30. - A plot has just been thwarted to blow up the "Holy Stair", on which it is claimed Christ walked when he ascended to the portico to appear before Pilate. The Stair is enclosed within one of the most visited sanctuaries at Rome, and pilgrims ascend it on their knees. The relic was threatened by a young atheist dynamiter who, after a long examination, broke down and confessed that he was the author of the sacrilege. He declared that he had a profound dislike of the Christian faith, and that his arrest had interrupted a series of acts of terrorism which he had planned against devotees. These plans, he intimated, included the destruction of the sanctuary of the Holy Stair and the Holy Stair itself.

The stairs of veined white marble, are 28 in number, and according to legend, were brought from Jerusalem by the Empress Helena. Originally in the old Lateran Palace, they were removed by order of Pope Sixtus V. and placed in the sanctuary they now occupy opposite the north-east corner of the Lateran. At the head of the steps, which are encased in wood, is the Sanctum, an old private chapel of the Popes, which contains a miraculous picture of Christ, which St. Luke began and superintended. Agency is said to have completed. Through the actual stairs must be ascended on the knees. There are side staircases which can be reached without any effort.

Recently famous statue of the Madonna at a village called Pine, amidst the Trentino mountains, was blown up, and at first it was believed it had been struck by lightning. Inspection proved however, that the supposed accident was a piece of vandalism.
