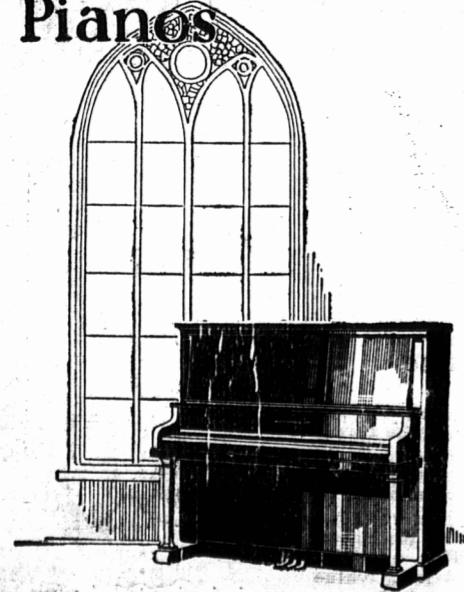

## Livestock Market

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, October 10.—There were 129 cattle, 55 calves, 284 hogs and 781 sheep and lambs for sale on the two markets and about 150 cattle left over from yesterday. Mostly bulls and canners. Cattle prices were steady. Light heifers sold from \$4.50 to \$6.75, common light steers from \$6.50 to \$8.00, common to medium cows from \$4.50 to \$7.00, with the bulk of the plain cows between \$4.75 to \$5.50. Gainers and cutters from \$3.25 to \$4.50 with average around \$3.75 and \$4.00. Bulls from \$5.25 to \$6.50 with bulk between \$5.50 to \$6.00 according to weight. Veal calves were in good demand at prices ranging from \$12.50 to \$14.50, grassers from \$6.00 to \$6.50. \$11.35 was the quotation for good lambs and sellers were asking \$11.50. Common to medium lambs from \$9.50 to \$10.50. Sheep brought from \$3.00 to \$5.50. Packers were offering \$11.25 for good hogs over 150 pounds sows were from \$10.00 to \$12.50.
