**ABOUT CORN**

Tall growing varieties of corn frequently send out secondary roots above ground level. It will be beneficial to these "brace roots" if, when hoeing, the soil is hilled up around them.

**KEEP COOL**

If tulip bulbs are to be stored for autumn planting, they should be dug up after the foliage has dried down, graded into even sizes and labeled carefully. Spread the stored bulbs thin or pack them in slatted boxes and keep them in a cool, dry place out of the sun and direct wind.

—FINE WAR MONUMENT—It is interesting to note that the Geddie Memorial Church Monument at New London dedicated to the memory of those who died in the Second Great War and unveiled with an impressive ceremony last Sunday was the work of Vere Beck and Son, monumental manufacturers, Montague, P. E. I. This beautiful monument stands seven feet two inches with two extending wings from the base two and a half feet high and approximately three feet wide. The whole structure is made of the finest Barre granite imported from the United States. The monument is sand-blast carved and lettered, inscribing the names of those who fell in the Second Great War.

largest breeder of silver foxes in the world for it is there that Fromm Bros. have their enormous ranches. Michigan comes next and the principal contributors to the quantity are Nieman Bros., cousins of the Fromms. However, Wisconsin also produced last season 44,722 wild mink skins which were taken by trappers, also many other skins of various fur bearing animals. In addition Wisconsin was the largest breeder of mutation mink and other ranch mink. Its climate is much like that of P. E. I. except that the Spring comes in one month earlier and cold weather is also earlier in the fall. The summers are quite hot. It is a rich agricultural country and was at one time a great forest country, but most of the wood has been cut down.

Horses on farms have continued to decline each season and the latest report shows they are the lowest in number since 1868. The number on hand at the beginning of this year in Canada and the

United States amounted to less than eight millions, a decrease of 10 per cent from the previous year. There were only about one-third the number of horses on farms at the beginning of 1947 as compared with the record high of 21,421,000 head on January 1st, 1915. If the present trend of

depleting off ranch horses and shipping them to Europe as food for human consumption and also shipping live horses to Europe for the same purpose, continues the depletion will become progressively greater and it may be that in less than half a century the horse population of America will be down to the two million mark. Right here on Prince Edward Island dozens and dozens of farmers are getting clear of horses and getting tractors so as to shorten labor and speed up the work. What is true here is also true in other agricultural sections of Canada and the United States.
