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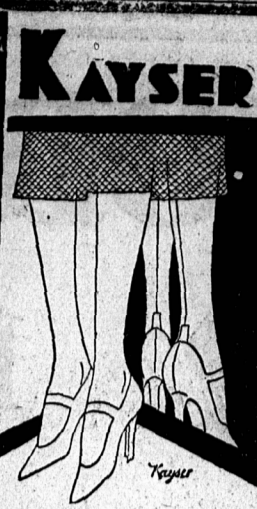

Mr. McFadyen later went to the lower Yukon and its tributaries, exploring extensively the Tanana, Kuskokwim, Iditarod, Inoko, Porcupine and other river systems, often musing in the open for weeks at a stretch with "Alaska feathers" (spruce boughs) for a mattress and the blue sky for a canopy.—K.
