CIVIC GOVERNMENT

The Busy East, under the caption "The Inevitable," strongly advocates the adoption of civic government by commission, in preference to the present system of government by ward representation, and ventures the assertion that within five years this form of government will have taken such root in our midst, and proved so eminently satisfactory as to leave with us a degree of astonishment at our tardiness in bowing to the inevitable.

The Guardian has more than once advocated the abolition of the ward system of civic government and quotes with pleasure the following, bearing on the subject from The Busy East: "On the detrimental effects of wardism in the general working out of the civic plan there is little need to expatiate. One ward is played against another—and often both ends are played against the middle—in a manner that works havoc with the 'sinews of war.'... A ward seat-seeker announcing his candidature will pledge himself to give the city the best he has; but always will conclude his appeal with the flat statement that this 'best' will be exercised particularly in the interests of Ward—"

The cities of Halifax and St. John have adopted the government by commission system and are quite satisfied with it, declaring it infinitely preferable to the former system of government by Council. The commission form has doubtless, many advantages. Under it capable men are placed in charge of the various departments and are paid for their work. Under the council system men are elected, not always because they possess special qualifications for government or for the administration of any department, but in many cases because they are 'nice fellows,' because they are seeking the honor, or because they are most likely to 'pull' for their own particular ward. This is not government. It may be comparatively, satisfactory, it may be as effective as any former civic government, and that is the comparison usually made, but it is neither business nor government.

The interests of a ward are merged in those of the city, and the well governed city looks after all its wards. The article referred to states that a certain maritime centre "could be named 'in which concrete sidewalks are laid on the unused sides of streets and out of the way corners over which a dozen people may not pass in the run of a month,' because aldermen are 'playing one ward against another.'"

seat at its Council Board. There are many cities, including our own City of Charlottetown, that do not feel justified in substituting paid commissioners for volunteer councillors. A happy and profitable medium would be found in abolishing the ward system entirely and electing men to represent the City, not a ward. In this case men of outstanding ability and fitness would be most likely to be selected. To quote again from The Busy East, "No sane, astute business man, of a mental calibre to deserve the name, will risk defeat at the polls where wardism runs rampant."

SHEEP RAISING

The "Weekly News Letter" issued by the Department of Agriculture of the United States contains an excellent article on "Dogs and Our Mutton Supply." It points out that the price of mutton and lamb continues to increase, while there is no increase in the number or size of the flocks in the farming states. In Britain, the article states, as the price of lamb increases the sheep becomes a more important animal, taking the place of some of the other farm animals. The "superfluous dog" constitutes a serious obstacle to the development of sheep raising in the United States. Questions were asked of correspondents in each of the States as to the reason for the stagnation of the sheep raising industry, 526 correspondents gave "dogs" as the great obstacle to the keeping of more sheep; 191 attributed the cause to fences; 122 complained of the prices obtained; while 63 gave "miscellaneous" reasons. In twenty-seven States the unanimous opinion of the correspondents was that 100 per cent more sheep might be kept without displacing other stock, if the dogs were destroyed. The Treasurer of one country in Ohio reports that 649 sheep were paid for in 1913 as having been killed by dogs; and in Indiana, 24,000,000 were killed. In this province the Government has sought to curtail the number of useless dogs by imposing a tax of \$1 per annum on dogs and \$3 on bitches, and have further encouraged the sheep-grower by supplying the Sheep Breeders' Association with funds to enable them to carry on an insurance scheme for sheep owned by members. The constitution and bye-laws will be ready for distribution in a few days, and a copy of them will be sent to every secretary of school trustees, who will be asked to bring them to the attention of the rate-payers at the close of the annual school meetings.

Accompanying this comes the announcement that Nationalist volunteers are being rapidly enrolled, and will prevent Mr. Redmond from making any concession to secure a peaceful settlement. If there is hope for Ireland at the present juncture it must be among the people who are not in politics and also think more than they talk.

Three hundred and fifty industries closed their doors in the State of New York alone during the past six months. The reason assigned by the manufacturers is that they have been unable to stand the unfair competition to which they are subjected by the Wilson-Underwood tariff. The wiping out of these industries has thrown nearly one hundred thousand men and women out of the employment. The wages they earned and spent in the United States are now earned and spent in foreign countries.

BERWICK, June 6.—If the pied piper of Hamelin can be located he will be given a job, at South Berwick. Within the next few days a plague of rats has settled on the famous apple-growing district. Breeders of fancy poultry have had their eggs and chicks destroyed in large numbers and the amusing audacity of the vermin as the subject of many interesting tales. ANOTHER ISLANDER LOST WITH EMPRESS

A letter has been received by Mr. DeYoung, of Charlottetown, informing her of the sad circumstance that her son, Joseph Kinsley, who was 20 years of age, was one of the victims in the sinking of the Empress of Ireland.

Kinsley was previously a deck hand on the D. G. S. Minto. Two years ago he left on board of the S. S. P. R. steamer for Liverpool, and since then has been employed regularly on one or other of the C. P. R. vessels as fireman.

Kinsley was married to a Liverpool girl and leaves, besides his mother, his widow and two children to mourn his loss.

S. A. CONGRESS MOURNS DISASTER

LONDON, June 5.—A hundred royal chairs in the arena of the Royal Albert Hall, which otherwise was packed from the floor to the ceiling told their own graphic story of the loss sustained by the Salvation Army when part of the Canadian contingent to the congress perished with the Empress of Ireland.

Last night's memorial service opened with a spectacular procession, headed by the international staff of songsters who softly sang a hymn which rose to a crescendo when the rostrum was reached. Following the band bearers with the flags of all the nations was the group of the Canadian contingent who had arrived in other ships. Behind these came the relatives and friends of the drowned Salvationists.

As the latter filed past the vacant chairs they slipped white mourning sashes inwoven with a cross and a crown on the seats, which during the meeting were occupied by only two general-bearers. General Booth conducted the meeting supported by the entire staff from headquarters together with many overseas officers. In his address the General extolled the devotion of the deceased officers dwelling particularly on Commissioner Rees. Colonel Malmstedt also expressed deep sympathy with all the relatives of the victims of the disaster, not forgetting the crew.

Concluding his remarks he read a message of sympathy just received from Queen Mary. Mrs. Booth and Commissioner Lawley were followed by Major and Mrs. Fraser, of Toronto and Commissioner Whitmore on behalf of the relatives of the dead.

A resolution of fraternal sympathy with the Canadian branch of the army was adopted by a standing vote. It was characteristic of the gathering that there was no funeral march and few tears. The Salvationists accepted the sad event according to their programme as promotion to glory from the Empress of Ireland.

CAPTAIN TO BLAME FOR LOSS OF STEAMER

MONTREAL, June 5.—Captain Lindsay, Dominion Wreck Commissioner, who, with Captain Neil Hall and R. MacDonald as assessors, investigated the stranding of Sambreton, N. S., on March 17th, of the S. S. City of Sydney, has given his finding in the case.

This is to the effect that the accident was caused by D. M. MacDonald, the master, not allowing sufficiently for a westerly set along the northern coast of Nova Scotia. The Court also found that the master could not have proceeded after hearing the fog signal on Sambreton, and that had the engines then been stopped, the accident would probably have been avoided. Besides censuring the captain, the Court severely criticized what appears to be the common practice on the coast of vessels proceeding at full speed in fog, which contrary to section 16 of the International Rules of the Road.

The crew and passengers on board at the time of the accident were saved, but the steamer was so badly damaged that it was abandoned.

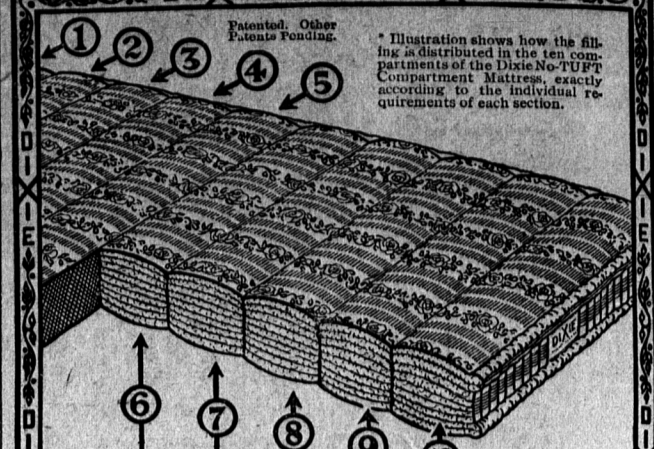
