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BURGLARS MISS CASH IN WRECK

WINCHESTER, N. H., April 13.—Half a dozen burglars, evidently nervous at their work, made an unsuccessful attempt early today to blow open the safe of the Winchester National Bank. Nitro-glycerine was used by the burglars, but their familiarity with this explosive is believed to be responsible for the failure of their undertaking, for the sound of the explosion was so great that the entire town was aroused and the robbers had to flee before they could force open the second door of the vault, in which \$26,000 of the bank's cash reposed.

The explosion occurred about 1:30 p. m., and a few minutes later a number of citizens were on the scene, but the burglars had escaped, and only one trace of them has been seen. Two men employed at the Lox factory in the section of the town nearest the neighboring city of Keene heard the explosion and a few minutes later saw five or six men running away. No attempt was made to follow the robbers by the men who saw them escaping.

When a number of citizens, headed by Casimir Franklin Kellom of the bank, entered the banking rooms they found that much of the bank's furniture had been destroyed by the force of the explosion, and the heavy outer door of the vault had been demolished. The inner door, which guards the vault where the cash is kept, had not been disturbed, however, as the robbers were not given time in which to attack this barrier.

An examination showed that the burglars were not experts in their craft. The nitro-glycerin had been inserted in a hole drilled in the outer door of the vault in such a quantity as to create a tremendous detonation, and the men had not muffled their work as experienced burglars would have done.

A posse of citizens was organized quickly by Deputy Sheriff Rixford and an attempt was made to race the burglars. The only clue to their location was that furnished by the employees of the box factory, and a search along the road leading to Keene proved fruitless. It is believed that the men escaped in an automobile. This belief is strengthened by the fact that no trace of the man, either singly or in a group, has been found since they were seen in the vicinity of the box factory.

The bank is a brick building located in the heart of the town. It contained only two rooms. The force of the explosion, in addition to ruining most of the furniture, scattered all the assortment of burglars' tools, including drills fuses and lagging, was left by the burglars in their hurry to make good their escape.

SEVEN LOST IN WRECK ON LAKES

TORONTO, Ont., April 13.—The schooner Ottawa is a wreck in Lake Superior off the Algoma shore, and seven of her crew have perished, according to a report received here tonight. Efforts to confirm the report and to get details have been unsuccessful.
