## Maroons Trounce Toronto Leafs In Torrid Tilt 6-3; Wings And Amerks Draw

MONTREAL, Jan. 6—(CP)—In a game of goals and fists, Montreal Maroons drubbed the leaders of their National Hockey League division, Toronto Maple Leafs, 6-3 tonight before 6,000 Montrealers. Leafs had promised to "rub it in" every time they met Maroons after the Montreal club let King Clancy go as coach last week. But after Toronto scored first Maroons went to work to devise a thorough beating that came to the accompaniment of a flood of penalties.

Red Horner of Toronto and Jimmy Ward of Maroons drew major and match penalties when they fought in the first period and resumed their duelling on the penalty bench. Nearly every player on both teams was involved in the battle. Referee Johnny Mitchell suffered a badly puffed face in breaking up the Leafs.

The result left Leafs a point ahead of New York Americans in the group standing. Toronto went ahead in the first seven minutes when Drillon sank Apps' pass but Maroons caught up after the Horner-Ward fight with Buzz Boll in the penalty box. Bob Gracie scored the tying goal and Cain, Wentworth and Blinco all scored before the first period ended.

Stew Evans put Maroons farther ahead in the early minutes of the second but Nick Metz cut the advantage to 5-2 with Allan Shields in the penalty box. Maroons made it 6-2 while Shields was still off. Northcott clicking on a breakaway and the final goal came before the second period ended, Apps converting a pass from Drillon.

Nine thousand fans watched the encounter. The Americans, battling to snare first place in the Canadian group from Toronto, opened the scoring late in the first frame. Hooley Smith, veteran centre, rang up the goal when he dribbled the puck past Normie Smith, as the Detroit goal minder lay prone on the ice.

The Detroiters knotted the count at the half way mark of the third session through Larry Aurie. He slammed a backhander into the American cage following a tricky passing bout with Doug Young and Marty Barry. The Red Wings dominated the offensive play for the balance of the period and during the overtime but could not score.

## Patrickmen Canadian Athletes Train Hand Hawks Aboard Ship Enroute To 4-1 Defeat Empire Games In Australia

CHICAGO, Jan. 6—(CP)—Shaking off Chicago's Indian sign, New York Rangers humbled the Black Hawks 4-1 tonight for their first win of the season over the third-place team of the National Hockey League's American group.

Rangers lost little time in turning the tables on the Chicago club. Alex Shibicky scored halfway through the opening period and Butch Keeling's blasted home a goal about a minute later. In the final minute of the period Doc Romnes, with help from Mueh March and Paul Thompson, scored the lone Chicago goal.

New York added to its lead in both of the final periods. Cecil Dillon scored in the second period after a pass from Babe Pratt, and in the closing frame, Bryan Hextall banged home a goal.

## Moncton Fans To Honour Drillon

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 6—More than 100 Moncton hockey fans will leave here tomorrow for "Drillon Night" at Maple Leaf Gardens, Toronto, Saturday night. Gordon Drillon, former Moncton junior star who now leads the National Hockey League in scoring points, will be presented with a gold watch by Mayor W. E. McLaughlin.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 6—New Brunswick rinks came through with victories in all four Stratheona Cup matches with the touring Scottish curlers here today, doubling the count on the visitors with three one-sided wins and one 17-16 decision. Total count gave New Brunswick 92 points, and the visitors 46.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 6—The Canadian team bound for the British Empire Games in Australia completed a fortnight on shipboard today as the liner Aorangi proceeded toward Suva. The first week at sea gave the 78 Canadians a chance to get acquainted, according to a letter written to the Canadian Press from Honolulu by M. M. (Bobby) Robinson of Burlington, Ont., the team's general manager. "Writing December 29 he said 'it is a happy family that looks toward the eight-day jump to Suva where where training ashore will again be popular.' The team sailed from Vancouver December 22. "Of course on a trip like this," wrote Mr. Robinson, "the troops develop their pets and to say that Kenny Jaggard, the 14 year old Vancouver ckwain, is the pet of the family is putting it mildly. Kenny is the big boy of the party. Christmas morning he was paraded for inspection and reprimanded for failure to shave. In the meantime he is developing into an autograph hound and his well-filled book will be the envy of his school mates when he returns."

"The team, travelling cabin class, has been granted the freedom of the ship and Captain T. V. Hill and his officers have co-operated to the utmost. "The gymnasium equipment has been severely punished and a net punching bag and other bits of equipment were secured in Honolulu.
