MONTREAL, Dec. 3 - (CP) - Canadian Pacific Railway Company today reported earnings for the week ended Nov. 30 at \$7,610,000, compared with \$7,952,000 in the corresponding week in 1946, a decrease of \$342,000 or 4.3 per cent.

Re-organize Ministerial Association

A largely attended meeting of the Protestant clergy of the Island was held in the Summerside Presbyterian Church Hall, Summerside, the afternoon of Monday, December 2nd, for the purpose of re-organizing the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association. Rev. T. H. Russell Somers, president of the association conducted the opening devotional exercises.

Following devotions, a business session was held, the president being in the chair. In the absence of the Secretary, Rev. Ernest J. Barrass was appointed as secretary for the meeting.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The president briefly outlined the purpose of the meeting, which purpose had been set forth in a letter sent to the Protestant clergy of the Island.

The retiring president thanked the members of the Association for their co-operation during his two years of office.

The election of officers then took place, the following being appointed:

President: Rev. G. Gough. Vice-Presidents: Revs. H. A. Bagnall, J. A. Jardine; a third to be elected by the Charlottetown branch of the association.

Secretary: Rev. J. A. Nicholson. Treasurer: Rev. E. J. Barrass.

These officers with one additional representative appointed by each district group, will act as an executive.

Rev. G. Gough duly took the chair as the new president of the P. E. I. Ministerial Association, thanking his fellow members for the honour conferred upon him. Upon motion a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the retiring president.

The meeting closed with the singing of "Blessed be the Tie That Binds", and the benediction pronounced by the president. -S.

Feels Commonwealth More Closely United

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 - (CP) - The British Commonwealth is not going to try alone "this time" the task of keeping peace in the world. A G. Bottomley, United Kingdom parliamentary under-secretary of State for Dominion Affairs, told a press conference here today.

Mr. Bottomley, making an official visit to this Dominion, was expressing only personal views, said he felt that the Commonwealth now is more closely united than ever.

He believed the Commonwealth was showing the United Nations that it had worked for peace between the two wars. Now the Commonwealth was not going to make people feel that peace has come until the machinery for keeping the peace is established. The Commonwealth was not going to try alone this time to keep the peace.

Mr. Bottomley said there would be little rebuilding of devastated or disrupted British industries until the housing needs of the people were met. Practically all materials now were being used to provide houses.
