W. W. Steeves, the well-known drug traveller, is in Moncton. Mr. Steeves has been laid up at his home in Petitoctiac for the past five weeks with a dislocated shoulder, this being his first trip since the mishap. Mr. Steeves is well known in this City.

Incandescent burners have been installed in York church by A. E. Ayliffe, London, England, and they give entire satisfaction. The next improvements will be sidewalks and improved railway facilities for the increasing business in this section of the Province.

A correspondent writing says the Uigg school under the direction of Miss McPhail, B.A., with Mr. Ross and Miss Huntley, assistants, is doing excellent work. Scholars are in attendance from Eldon, Valleyfield, Newtown, Montague Head, Grandview and Alexandria.

F. O. Boisner of Newton Centre, son of Charles and Eliza Boisner, of this Province died in Newton Centre, Mass., the 28th of March, after a lingering illness. He leaves a wife and daughter. The burial took place April 1st at the Newton cemetery. At the funeral services were several members of the local carpenters' union of which he was a member. The Rev. L. J. Birney officiated.

The house of representatives at the state House, Boston, last week by a vote of 45 in the affirmative and 152 in the negative refused to pass the resolve authorizing the county of Essex to reimburse Joseph S. Trimble, guardian of Edgar W. Merkle whose father formerly belonged to the Charlottetown for cash expended by him in the defence of his ward on an indictment for murder of his father. Representative McCann led the debate to pass the bill over the veto. He gave a history of the case from the first. He said that the single question was whether this innocent boy, confined for about eight months in the house of correction, placed on trial for the murder of his father, then acquitted, should be reimbursed for the actual cash expended by his guardian in his defence.

He said that the boy had been unjustly accused; that the Lynn police refused to prosecute him as the facts did not in any way warrant them in doing so; that he was deprived of his schooling during the time he was confined and the claim was in every way just and proper for the county to meet. Referring to the fact in the veto message that such legislation as proposed would establish a dangerous precedent, Representative McCann cited two precedents showing that the state has already paid sums of money to two persons who had been unjustly accused of crime. Speaking in relation to the question whether the boy should have had counsel assigned by the court, he called attention to the fact that Judge Sisk, the boy's counsel had several times endeavored to have the court assigned himself and his brothers as counsel, and in this way bring the expense on the county, but that in each instant the court refused to do so. The ground taken was that the father on his death left personal property amounting to upward of \$2000 and therefore the defendant was not devoid of funds to secure proper defence.

The death occurred at Marshfield of a prominent and highly respected farmer yesterday morning in the person of James Wyatt, at the age of 75 years. Mr. Wyatt, although ailing for sometime was not thought to be seriously ill and his death was somewhat unexpected. He leaves to mourn three daughters, two of whom reside at home and one in the United States.

A meeting of much interest to women was held on last Monday afternoon in Vancouver, in the board of trade rooms, when the subject of Home Making was discussed. The chair was taken by Mrs. Peter McNaughton and the speakers included Mrs. Bayfield of Prince Edward Island, convener of the National Council of Women Home Making committee.

Charlottetown theatre goers will be sorry to hear that their favorite the W. S. Harkins Company will not be here this year. They returned to New York last week direct from Trinidad and were there disbanded. Mr. Harkins would have come to Charlottetown and other Maritime Province cities for short engagements, but it was impossible to get early dates, so he sailed direct to New York and there disbanded the troupe. The West India engagement was a very successful one.

The remains of the late Garfield MacDonald, who was killed on the 9th inst., in British Columbia left on Sunday for Charlottetown accompanied by the brother and sister of the deceased. Mr. MacDonald was the son of Hector MacDonald formerly of Bradshaw and now of the Prince Edward Island Railway. He was working on the C. P. R. when the fatal accident occurred, but no particulars have been received. One brother John is in the office of the Steam Navigation Company.
